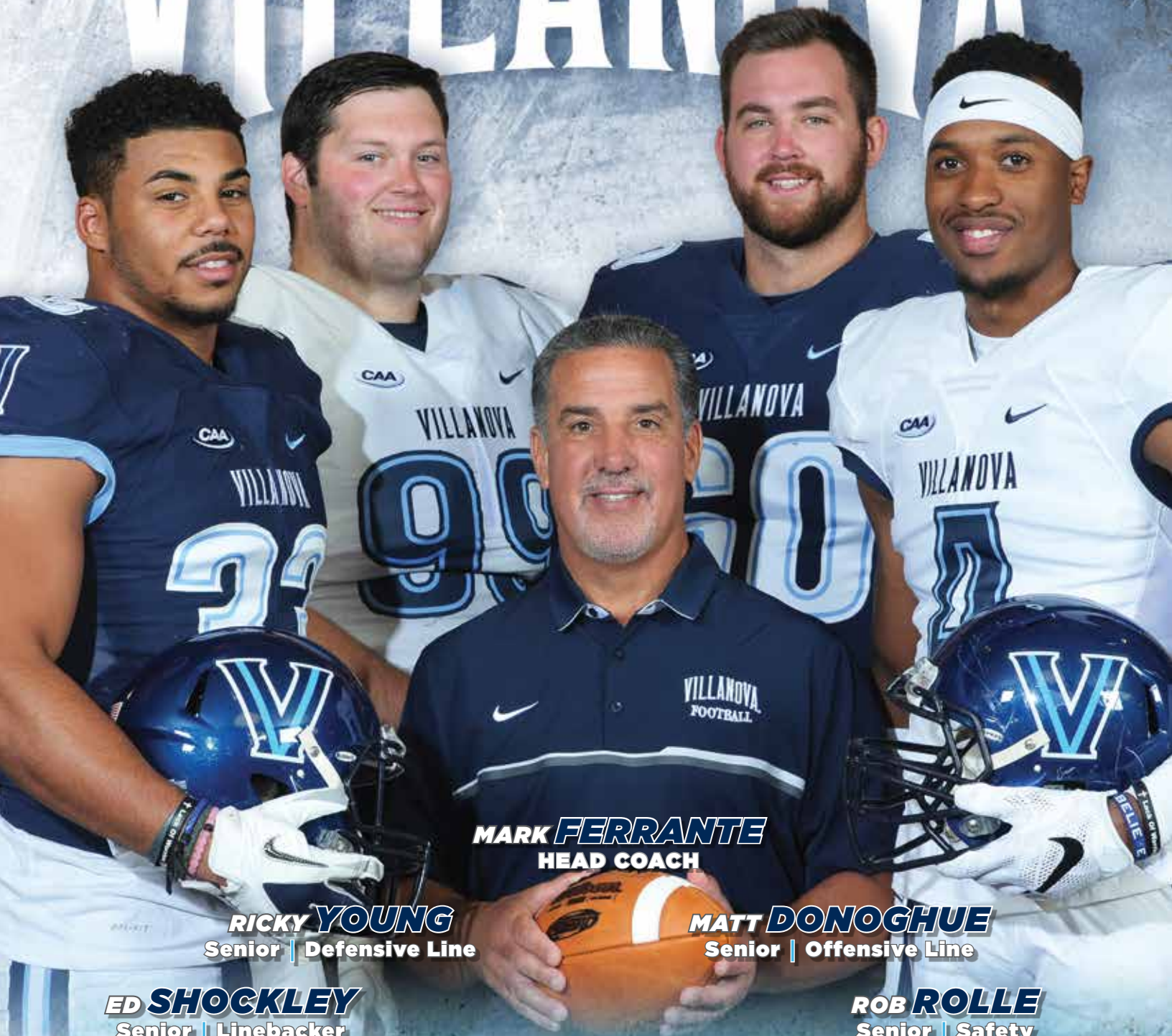

GENERAL INFORMATION: The 2017 Villanova Football Media Guide was prepared by the Villanova University Office of Media Relations specifically to assist the media in their coverage of Wildcat Football. In-season requests for additional information, interviews and photographs should be directed to Dean Kenefick, Associate Athletics Director/Communications, Villanova University, 800 Lancaster Avenue, Jake Nevin Field House, Villanova, PA 19085-1674, (Phone 610-519-6514).

GAME CREDENTIALS: Only accredited members of the media will receive credentials for any game. Requests for credentials should be made by noon on the day prior to the game. No requests will be honored after that time. Credentials at Villanova Stadium may be picked up two hours prior to kickoff at the press window, located at the base of the Villanova Stadium press box. Credentials should be requested through the Villanova University Office of Media Relations, by contacting Dean Kenefick at 610-519-6514. A valid form of identification is required to pick up media credentials.

PHOTO AND FILM CREDENTIALS: All photo and game film credentials should be requested as early as possible, and no later than noon on the day prior to the game. No photo credentials will be approved the day of the game. Photographers and film crews may work the sidelines between the 35-yard line and the endzone in both directions. Photographers and film crews on the sidelines and endzones assume responsibility for all risks.

RADIO: Credentials for visiting radio will be limited to four persons unless prior arrangements have been made. Rental of the phone lines is on a first-come, first-served basis. For addition information on reserving phone lines, please contact Dean Kenefick at 610-519-6514.

PRESS BOX GAME SERVICES: Pre-game notes and fact sheets, current statistics, media guides, flip cards/lineups will be issued prior to the start of each Villanova home football game. Halftime statistics, as well as complete play-by-play, final team and individual statistics will be provided to the media following the game. Also, any post-game quote requests should be made prior to kickoff; a post-game interview session is conducted in the press box conference room 15 minutes after each home game. This season, the visiting teams' head coach and selected student-athletes will be brought to the interview room first; after 10 minutes, Villanova University head coach Andy Talley and selected student-athletes will be brought to the interview room.

INTERVIEWS: All requests for player or coach interviews, either in person or via phone, will be arranged by the Villanova University Office of Media Relations by contacting Dean Kenefick at 610-519-6514. The Wildcat locker room, at home and on the road, is closed to members of the media.

WEEKLY PRESS CONFERENCE: A weekly press luncheon featuring Villanova University, the University of Pennsylvania, and other Philadelphia area collegiate football programs is held each Wednesday during the football season.

Members of the media are welcome to attend. Villanova Football head coach Mark Ferrante will be available at each luncheon. The luncheons alternate between the Koslov Room in the Tse Sports Center at the University of Pennsylvania, and in the Talley Athletic Center at Villanova University. Lunch will be served beginning at 11:15 a.m. Question and answer sessions with the Philadelphia coaches begin at noon. Charge to the media is \$15.00.

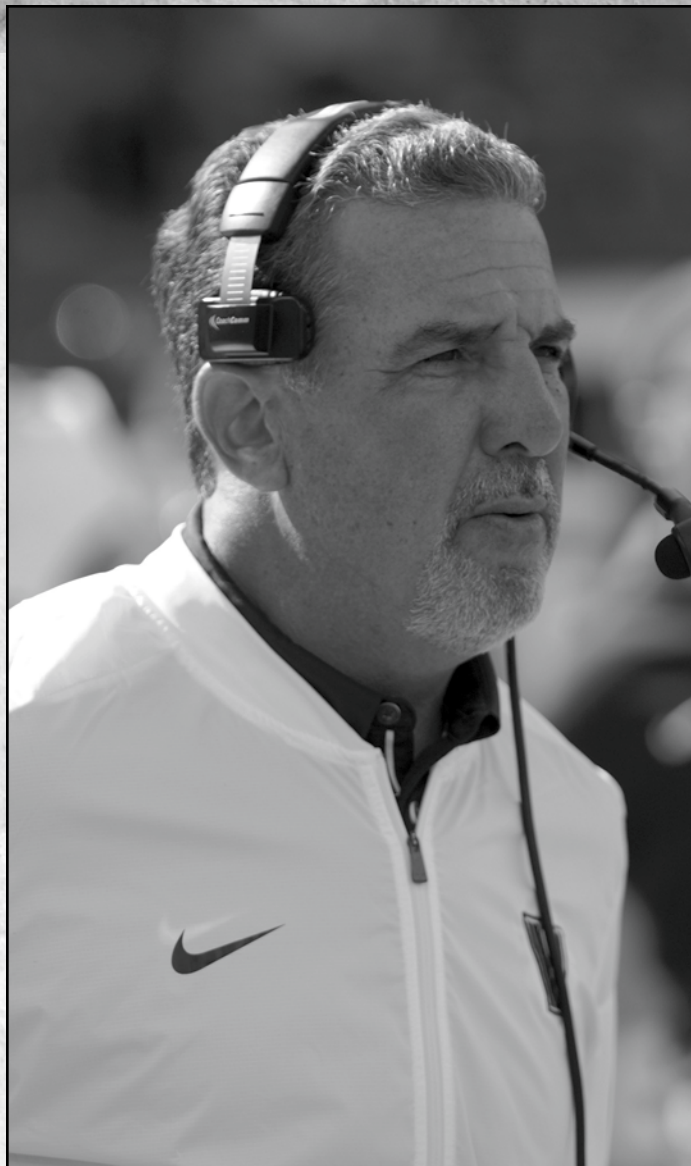

At halftime of the University of Delaware game in 1994, Villanova University began a "Wall of Fame" by retiring the jerseys of five former Wildcat Football greats in a special ceremony to honor their outstanding careers. The retired jerseys are permanently recognized on the wall of The Swimming Center next to the scoreboard in the west end of Villanova Stadium in the form of football-shaped plaques, bearing each recipient's name and number. Below are profiles of each of the individuals who are honored on the Wall of Fame.

1994 INDUCTION CLASS

The first group of honorees to the Villanova Wall of Fame was an impressive one, and shows the history and tradition of 100 years of outstanding football student-athletes on the Main Line.

LOU FERRY (1945-48 PLAYER; 1960-2003 COACH)

- All-East and All-America honoree
- Played for seven seasons in the NFL
- Villanova head coach from 1970-74

DOMINIC LIOTTA (1949-51)

- Played offensive guard; co-captain in 1951
- Earned mention on six different All-America teams
- Appeared on the "Ed Sullivan Show"

ED MICHAELS (1933-35)

- Villanova's first-ever All-American in 1935
- Played in the NFL and Canadian Football League
- Villanova assistant coach from 1951 to 1961

MIKE SIANI (1969-71)

- Ranks near top of every Villanova receiving record
- Owns record for receiving yards in a single season
- NFL player with Oakland Raiders, Baltimore Colts

JOHN WYSOCKI (1936-38)

- Consensus All-American two straight years
- Played 1937 Bacardi Bowl, first Villanova bowl
- Had three career touchdowns on blocked kicks

1995 INDUCTION CLASS

In 1995 the Wildcats continued a new tradition by inducting three more players onto the Wall of Fame. This year's induction class included NFL Hall of Fame inductee Howie Long.

HOWIE LONG (1977-80)

- MVP of Blue-Gray All-Star Classic as a senior
- Registered 313 tackles during his Wildcat career
- 10-time Pro Bowl selection during NFL career
- NFL Hall of Fame

JORDAN OLIVAR (1935, 1937 PLAYER; 1943-48 COACH)

- Co-captain and co-MVP of undefeated 1937 team
- Head coach at Villanova from 1943-48
- Compiled 33-20-1 (.620) record as a head coach

JOHN SANDUSKY (1946-49)

- Regarded as one of quickest big men in the nation
- Garnered All-America honors in 1949
- Player and coach in the NFL

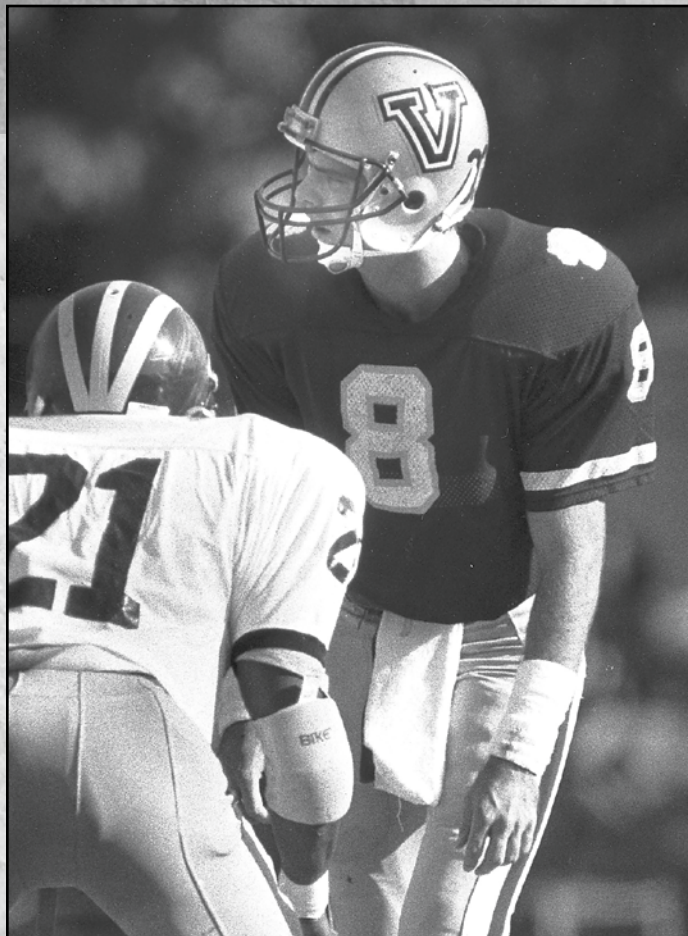

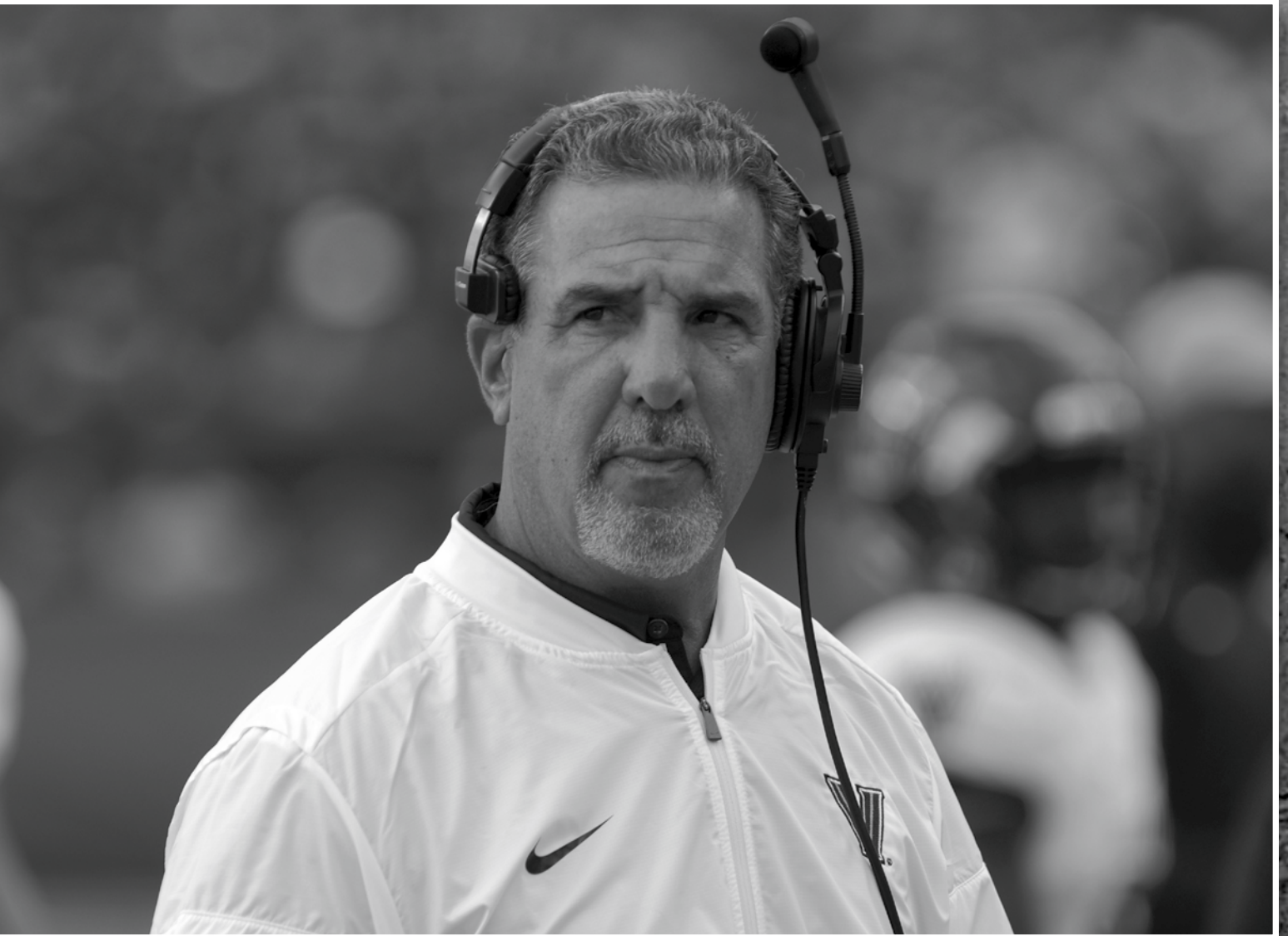

MARK FERRANTE • HEAD COACH

A longtime member of the Wildcats coaching staff, Mark Ferrante takes over the reins of the program for his first season as head coach in 2017. Ferrante was an assistant coach under Andy Talley for the past 30 years, including the last 18 seasons as Assistant Head Coach. It was announced at a press conference on January 30, 2016, that Ferrante would become the 30th head coach of the Villanova Football program following Talley's retirement at the end of the 2016 season.

Ferrante will lead one of the nation's elite FCS programs after playing an instrumental role in the Wildcats rise to national prominence over the past three decades. He has been a part of the coaching staff for all 12 of the team's FCS playoff trips, including three national semifinal appearances and winning the 2009 national championship. Villanova has also won six conference titles, three Lambert Meadowlands Cups and three ECAC Team of the Year awards. Six of the Wildcats playoff appearances have come in the past nine years alone, and the team has been a mainstay in the national rankings for much of that recent span.

Others have taken note of the success that Ferrante has been a part of throughout his time on the Main Line. At the end of the 2015 season, he was named the FCS Assistant Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA). This award was first presented in 1997 and was created to honor assistant coaches who



excel in community service, commitment to the student-athlete, on-field coaching success and AFCA professional organization involvement.

Those characteristics exemplify Ferrante's dedication to the complete student-athlete experience, evidence of which can be seen in the program's consistent academic success. The football team has earned public recognition awards from the NCAA in each of the last two years for ranking in the

top 10 percent of FCS programs in academic performance measured by the multi-year Academic Progress Rate (APR). In addition, a Villanova student-athlete has been named the CAA Football Scholar-Athlete of the Year four times in the past 10 years. More than 40 student-athletes from the Wildcats have been named to the CAA All-Academic Team in each of the past two academic years.

One of Ferrante's biggest success stories was coaching Jake Prus on the Villanova offensive line. Prus was identified as a bone marrow match for a patient in need at the start of his senior year in 2015, and took time out of the season to donate peripheral blood stem cells to the patient he was a match for. Prus excelled both on and off the field for the Wildcats, and was named the winner of the CAA Football Chuck Boone Leadership Award following the 2015 season. He was also selected as the league's Scholar-Athlete of the Year for the 2015-16 academic year, and was a two-time Capital One Academic All-District selection.

As Andy Talley's right-hand man for so many years, Ferrante was involved in every facet of the Wildcats program. On the field, he coached the Villanova offensive line for the last 27 seasons and developed a unit that is traditionally one of the best in CAA Football. Over the years he has coached three All-Americans, 11 All-East performers and 15 first team All-Conference selections.

Two of Ferrante's players went on to be NFL draft picks, including second-round se-

lection Ben Ijalana by the Indianapolis Colts (2011) and seventh-round pick Brad Seaton by the Tennessee Titans (2017). Seaton was a second team CAA Football All-Conference selection in 2016, when the offensive line enabled Villanova to average 206.3 rushing yards and 378.7 yards of total offense per game. The Wildcats ranked third in CAA Football and 24th in the nation in rushing

offense, in addition to ranking fourth in the league in total offense and fifth with a scoring average of 24.4 points per game.

Ijalana was an All-American in both 2009 and 2010, as well as being a three-time first team All-CAA selection during his collegiate career. Villanova reached the FCS playoffs in each of Ijalana's last three seasons on the team, winning the 2009 national title

and advancing to the semifinal round a year later. The other All-Americans who Ferrante has mentored are Eamonn Allen (2001) and Bryan Russo (1989). Allen earned first team Associated Press All-America recognition in 2001 and was also a first team All-East and first team All-Atlantic 10 selection.

Villanova's offensive line has produced 17 all-conference performers in the last nine years, including six first team selections, five second team picks and six third team honorees in that span. In addition to Ijalana, the other first team selections are Brant Clouser (2010), Dan Shirey (2011) and Vince Kowalski (2014).

Ferrante was a standout collegiate player in his own right prior to joining the coaching ranks. He was the quarterback for Andy Talley at St. Lawrence University, where he was named a second team All-American in 1982 and also earned first team All-East honors. Ferrante directed the offense for a St. Lawrence team that went 10-1 during the 1982 season and reached the national semifinals in the playoffs.

Ferrante went on to join Talley's coaching staff at St. Lawrence, and spent one season as the running backs coach in 1983. His other coaching stops before coming to Villanova include coaching the running backs at Wagner (1984) and Lafayette (1985-86).

Ferrante and his wife, Georgea, reside in Phoenixville, Pa. The couple have a 21-year-old son, Jimmy, who will begin his senior year at Villanova in the fall of 2017.





ANDY TALLEY • HEAD COACH EMERITUS

Andy Talley won more than 250 games during his legendary head coaching career, which spanned 37 seasons overall and 32 years at Villanova. Talley compiled a career record of 258-155-2 (.624) as a head coach, including 230-137-1 (.626) in his 32 seasons (1985-2016) with the Wildcats. He is the winningest head coach in Villanova football history, and during his final season in 2016 had the most wins of any active FBS or FCS head coach.

Talley guided the Wildcats to their first-ever national championship season in 2009, and Villanova made a total of 12 appearances in the FCS playoffs during his tenure. The team also won at least a share of six conference championships under Talley's watch, in addition to winning the Lambert Meadowlands Cup three times to go along with three ECAC Team of the Year awards. Talley's all-time record in the postseason was 12-11, and he won nine of his final 14 playoff games.

In addition to the great teams he built, Talley was also able to lead great players. He mentored three Walter Payton Award winners, one Jerry Rice Award honoree, 16 first team All-Americans, 243 All-Conference performers, 15 major conference award winners and 62 All-East honorees. Brian Finneran was the 1997 winner of the Walter Payton Award, which is given to the top player in FCS football. He has since been joined among Villanova winners by Brian Westbrook (2001) and John Robertson (2014). Robertson also won the Jerry Rice Award as the top FCS freshman in 2012, and his selection as the 2014 Walter Payton Award winner made the Wildcats the only FCS program to have three winners of the highest FCS honor.

Talley coached the following players to first team All-America distinction during his time at Villanova: Eamonn Allen (offensive line, 2001); Paul Berardelli (guard, 1988); Chris Boden (quarterback, 1997); Don Cherry (linebacker, 2014); Curtis Eller (linebacker, 1991-92); Brian Finneran (wide receiver, 1996-97); Tyrone Frazier (linebacker, 1994); Brett Gordon (quarterback, 2002); Brian Hulea (linebacker, 2005); Ben Ijalana (offensive tackle, 2009-10); Tanoh Kpassagnon (defense end, 2016); Greg Miller (defensive line, 2008); John Robertson (quarterback, 2014); Bryan Russo (center, 1989); Matt Szczur (wide receiver, 2009); and Brian Westbrook (running back/kick returner, 1998, 2000, 2001).

Eller was named to the Yankee Conference 50th Anniversary Team in 1996. He was a two-time conference Defensive Player of the Year in 1991-92, while Kpassagnon joined him in earning that distinc-

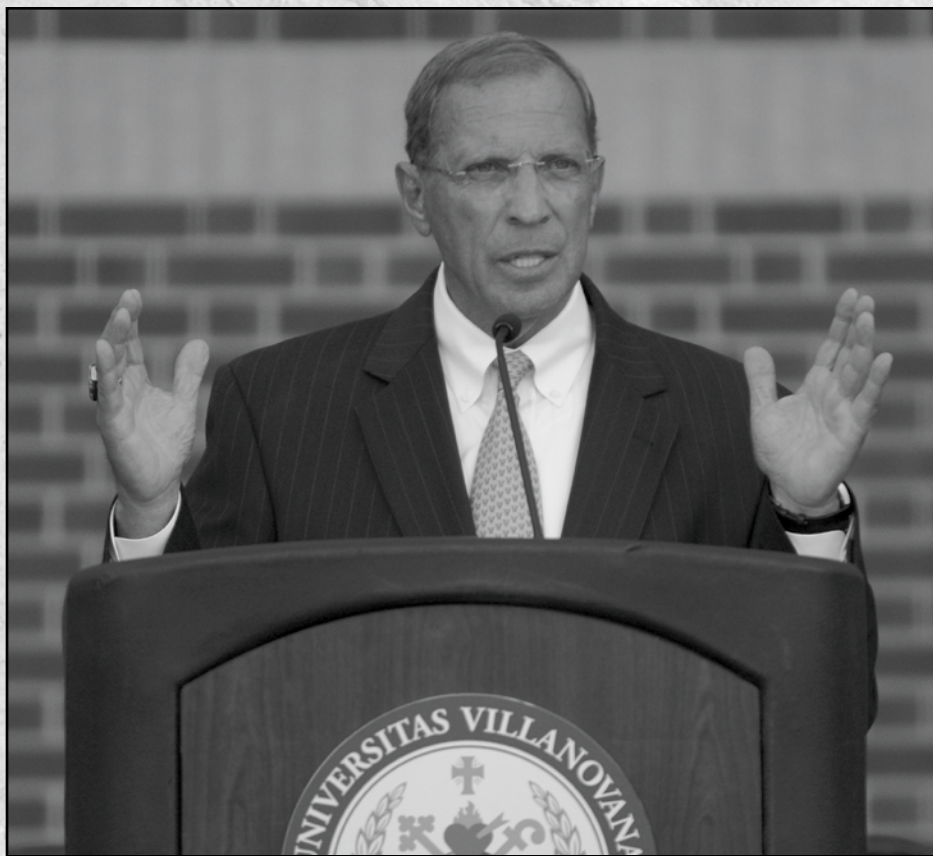


tion in 2016. Westbrook was the conference Offensive Player of the Year in 2000 and 2001, while Gordon (2002), Szczur (2009) and Robertson (2014) also won that award. Szczur made history in 2009 when he became just the second player in league history to win two major awards in

one year. He was both the Offensive Player of the Year and the Special Teams Player of the Year that season. Other major conference honors for the Wildcats during Talley's watch include quarterbacks John Robertson (2012) and Zach Bednarczyk (2015) being named the conference Offensive Rookie of the Year, linebacker Dillon Lucas being selected as the league Defensive Rookie of the Year (2011) and offensive lineman Jake Prus winning the Chuck Boone Leadership Award in 2015.

For Talley, the team and individual accomplishments on the field were only a part of the story. Perhaps of greater importance to him than the victories and the athletic accolades were the type of student-athletes that were a part of his program. Villanova had 14 Capital One Academic All-Americans during his career, as well as two NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship winners and more than 300 academic all-conference performers.

Talley was appreciative of the opportunities provided to him through athletics from the early days of his coaching career, and continually looked for ways to give something back to others. The area off the field to which Talley dedicates most of his time is the National Marrow Donor Program. With this group, he works

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to have potential bone marrow donors entered in a national bone marrow registry, increasing the odds of a needy patient being able to find a "match" for their bone marrow. In 2008, Talley officially partnered with Be The Match to start the "Get In The Game and Save a Life" (GITG) marrow donor registry campaign. Since that time, and with the help of 80 college football programs that Talley has enlisted from all divisions, over 71,000 new potential donors have been added to the worldwide registry of potential donors. Even more impressive, the GITG program has been responsible for over 300 potentially lifesaving stem cell/marrow transplants in just eight years.

For his efforts with the bone marrow program, Talley has received numerous awards and accolades. In September 2014, he was awarded the Rod Carew Leadership Award which is given by the National Marrow Donor Program to the person or organization who make a profound difference in the lives of patients and their families. In January of 2015, he was named the Shining Star Lifetime Achievement Award winner by the March of Dimes, while in April of 2015, Talley was given the Gift of Life Award by the Bone Marrow Foundation.

In the spring of 2010, he was presented The Person of the Decade Award by the Temple Bone Marrow Transplant Program of Temple University Hospital. In 2009, he was given the Volunteer of the Year Award by the Laurie Strauss Foundation and the Collegiate Award by the National Marrow Donor Program (NMDP). The Strauss Foundation Award recognizes an individual for instilling compassion in collegiate student-athletes and the Collegiate Award is given to an individual or university in honor of outstanding commitment to raising awareness, recruiting donors and supporting life-saving work of the NMDP.

During the summer of 2008, The Philadelphia Sports Congress gave Talley its 2008 Community Service Award which is presented to the individual, business or organization that has done the most to contribute to the quality of life in Philadelphia through sports. He was also named one of the 75 greatest Living Philadelphians in a survey conducted by the Philadelphia Eagles and Dunkin Donuts for his long standing commitment and ongoing contributions to the city of Philadelphia.

Talley also often serves as a featured speaker at many business and community functions. He acts as President of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame Philadelphia Chapter. In December of 2000,

Talley was one of two chapter presidents to be honored by the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame and received an award for his leadership of the Philadelphia Chapter at the famous Waldorf Astoria Hotel. Talley was also given a Lifetime Achievement Award in January of 2000 by the All-American Football Foundation.

Before coming to Villanova, Talley served as the head football coach at St. Lawrence University, where in 1982, he led St. Lawrence to the Division III Lambert-Meadowlands Trophy as the top team in the East. That year, Talley was named the American Football Coaches Association/Kodak Division III Region I Coach of the Year, as well as the Metropolitan New York Sportswriters/ECAC Coach of the Year.

Talley's coaching career began at Simsbury (Conn.) High School in 1967 where he was an assistant coach for two years. In 1969, he became the defensive secondary coach at Springfield (Mass.) College for one year and then was the offensive backfield coach at Middlebury (Vt.) College from 1970-73.

Talley had his first experience of rebuilding a program when he became the offensive back-field coach at Brown University in 1973. Having experienced several losing seasons prior to 1973, Talley was on the staff while they compiled a 36-15-2 overall record in six seasons, including the Ivy League title in 1976.

From there, he was named the head coach at St. Lawrence (N.Y.) University, a position he held until his appointment at Villanova in May, 1984. Talley rebuilt the St. Lawrence program, and led the Saints to a 28-18-1 record in five seasons, including an undefeated regular season in 1982 when he advanced to the NCAA Division III semifinals.

During the winter of 1996, Talley was inducted into the Haverford Hall of Fame. He

played four seasons at defensive back for Southern Connecticut University, graduating with honors in 1967 and earning a Masters Degree in Education in 1969. In the spring of 1998, Talley was inducted into the Southern Connecticut Hall of Fame. In November, 2005, he was recognized by the Delaware County Hall of Fame, while in June of 2006, he was inducted into the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame Delaware County Chapter. During the summer of 2007, he earned a spot in the Pennsylvania State Hall of Fame.

In March, 2012, Talley earned yet another Hall of Fame honor when he was inducted into the Villanova University Varsity Club Hall of Fame.

A graduate of Haverford (Pa.) High School just five minutes from the Villanova campus, Talley is a native of Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania. He and his wife, Arlene, currently reside in Berwyn, Pa. They are the parents of two children: Josh, a graduate of both Brown University, and Villanova Law School who is currently a practicing lawyer in Philadelphia and Gina, who earned her undergraduate degree from the University of Pennsylvania and a Masters Degree from New York University. Currently, Gina is a doctoral candidate in history at University of Massachusetts, Amherst and is a faculty advisor in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences at Villanova University.

In more than two decades on the Villanova coaching staff, Sam Venuto has been instrumental in the Wildcats being among the top FCS programs in the nation and a perennial CAA Football contender. Regarded as one of the top offensive coordinators in FCS football, Venuto is in his 23rd season at Villanova in 2017 and his 19th year in the Offensive Coordinator role. He also coaches the Wildcats quarterbacks and handles recruiting in the Philadelphia area and New Jersey.

Throughout his time on the Main Line, Venuto has helped many of his student-athletes stand out on the national level. Most notably, he has helped three different players win the Walter Payton Award as the top player in FCS football. The most recent winner of the award was quarterback John Robertson in 2014, when he was a consensus first team All-American and both the CAA Football and ECAC Offensive Player of the Year. Robertson set the school record for career yards of total offense with 10,933 and finished his collegiate career ranked fourth in school history in passing yards (7,290) and second in rushing yards (3,643). He was the CAA Football Offensive Rookie of the Year in 2012 in addition to winning the Jerry Rice Award as the top freshman in the FCS ranks. Robertson went on to earn All-CAA honors in both 2013 and 2014.

Running back Brian Westbrook was the Walter Payton Award winner in 2001 when he amassed 2,823 all-purpose yards in Venuto's offensive scheme. Westbrook is the most decorated player in school history, and at the end of his collegiate career held 41 school records, 19 Atlantic 10 records and five NCAA records. He became the first college football player at any level to have over 1,000 yards rushing and receiving in the same season, and was the Wildcats first player to be a three-time first team All-American. Brian Finneran was the first Villanova player to win the Walter Payton Award, and he did so in 1997 when Venuto coached the Wildcats receivers. Finneran won numerous awards in 1997, including being named the ECAC Offensive Player of the Year and the Atlantic 10 Offensive Player of the Year.

Villanova had a strong season offensively in 2016 along the way to posting a 9-4 record and reaching the second round of the FCS playoffs. Venuto guided an offense that produced 24.4 points per game and 378.8 yards of total offense per contest. A balance between the running and passing games helped the Wildcats surpass 30 points six times last year, including a string of four straight such games in the midst of a five-game winning streak early in the season.

Sophomore quarterback Zach Bednarczyk continued his development into a top-notch FCS quarterback in 2016 after earning CAA Football Co-Offensive Rookie of the Year honors as a redshirt freshman the previous season. Bednarczyk threw for 2,158 yards with 19 touchdowns in 13 games during the 2016 campaign, and was also the Wildcats second-leading rusher with 539 yards and two scores.

Villanova's primary quarterback has earned CAA Football All-Conference honors in six of the last eight seasons, with Bednarczyk the latest in a line of all-stars under center. His predecessor was Robertson, who led the Wildcats offense that averaged 37.7 points per game with 470.4 yards of total offense during the 2014 season. Villanova led the CAA in both scoring offense and rushing yards per game (242.9) that season, with the rushing average ranking eighth in the country. Robertson was the fifth player to earn conference player of the year honors under Venuto's watch.

During the Wildcats run to their first national title in 2009, Venuto was named a finalist for National Coordinator of the Year after his offense led CAA Football in three different offensive categories. Villanova averaged 30.8 points per game and 194.9 rushing yards per contest, and also led the league with a 149.9 passing efficiency rating. Venuto led seven players to All-CAA distinction in 2009, headlined by CAA Offensive Player of the Year Matt Szczur and a first team all-conference selection in Chris Whitney.

Venuto came to the Wildcats with a wealth of coaching experience, and he worked

with the Villanova receivers for his first four years on staff. He began his coaching career in 1982 at his alma mater, Delaware, where he was the freshman offensive line and linebackers coach. He spent one season at Colby College in 1984 and then three years at James Madison (1985-87) as the quarterbacks coach. During the 1988 season, he was the assistant quarterbacks coach and the receivers coach at Illinois. Venuto also was the passing game coordinator and receivers coach at Southern Illinois from 1989-93, and worked as the tight ends coach and the head junior varsity coach at Cornell prior to coming to Villanova.

During his own collegiate career, Venuto was a linebacker at Delaware and a member of the Blue Hens 1979 national championship team. He owns a Bachelor's Degree in Physical Education from Delaware and a Master's Degree in Education from James Madison.

Venuto and his wife, Diane, reside in Collegeville, Pa. with their daughter Amanda (21) and son Ricky (19). Amanda is currently a senior at the University of Delaware, while Ricky is a sophomore quarterback at Muhlenberg College.

VILLANOVA**JOE

LINEBACKERS COACH • 12th Season**

Joe Trainer will spend his 12th season overall on the Villanova coaching staff in 2017, and his fourth year back with the Wildcats since returning in 2014 for his second stint on the Main Line. Trainer is the team's Defensive Coordinator and will work with the Villanova linebackers this season. He handles recruiting for Villanova in Philadelphia County (North) and in New Jersey in Burlington, Mercer, Middlesex, Monmouth and Ocean counties. Trainer was formerly an assistant coach at Villanova from 1997-04, and was the team's Defensive Coordinator for the final

five years of his first stint on the Main Line. He also has collegiate head coaching experience at Millersville and Rhode Island among his coaching stops.

Last season was one of the most rewarding for Trainer in his time at Villanova, as he coached defensive end Tanoh Kpassagnon who went on to be a second round pick in the NFL Draft. Kpassagnon, who was also a consensus first team All-American, was selected as the CAA Football Defensive Player of the Year and was named to the All-CAA first team for the second straight year. He racked up 21.5 tackles for loss and 11.0 sacks in 13 games last season, making 45 tackles overall and adding two fumble recoveries, one forced fumble and a blocked kick. Kpassagnon was chosen by the Kansas City Chiefs with the 59th overall pick in the 2017 draft.

In his first season back at Villanova in 2014, Trainer guided senior nose guard Pat Williams to second team CAA Football All-Conference accolades. Williams had his best season as a senior and finished the 2014 campaign with 36 total tackles, including 12.5 tackles for loss and three sacks. He also had two fumble recoveries, one forced fumble, a blocked kick and four pass breakups on the year. With the selections of Kpassagnon to the All-CAA squad in each of the last two years, Trainer is working with a defensive line that has produced at least one all-conference performer in six consecutive seasons.

Trainer spent five years as the head coach at CAA Football member Rhode Island from 2009-13 before returning to Villanova. He was voted the CAA Coach of the Year in 2010 after leading the Rams to five wins, including a 4-4 record in conference play and four victories over nationally-ranked opponents during the year. Trainer coached 44 players who earned CAA All-Academic Team honors during his five-year tenure, as well as 18 All-CAA honorees and one All-American.

Trainer was also the head coach at Division II Millersville from 2005-07, then spent the 2008 season as Rhode Island's Defensive Coordinator before being elevated to the head coaching position.

During his first stint at Villanova from 1997-04, Trainer coached numerous players to all-conference acclaim. Three of his defensive standouts were first team All-Atlantic 10 selections in 2003, including defensive end Darrell Adams, linebacker Brian Hulea

and safety Raymond Ventrone. Trainer also helped linebacker Shaun Lyons (1996-99) become the second player in program history to record at least 400 career tackles.

Trainer came to the Wildcats in 1997 after serving as Defensive Coordinator at New Haven for two years. He has also coached at Colgate, Frostburg State and Temple. Trainer is a 1990 graduate of Dickinson where he earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in English. Brian Flinn returns to Villanova for his 13th season overall, and his 12th as the team's wide receivers coach. He previously coached the Wildcats tight ends during the 2000 season. Flinn's recruiting area includes local schools in Pennsylvania, New Jersey in Bergen, Essex, Hudson, Hunterdon, Morris, Passaic, Somerset, Sussex, Union and Warren counties, and nationally in Kentucky, Indiana, Michigan, Ohio and Tennessee.

During his time with at Villanova, Flinn has produced a steady stream of all-conference performers. The most recent Wildcats receiver to garner All-CAA honors was Kevin Gulyas, who was a second team selection in 2015 when he led the team with 40 catches for 608 yards and seven touchdowns. Gulyas also averaged 25.1 yards per catch and scored nine touchdowns in 2014, and senior Poppy Livers was a second team All-CAA pick that year after a season where he tallied 67 receptions for 987 yards and nine touchdowns.

Junior wide receiver Norman White had a breakout 2010 season for Villanova under Flinn's tutelage. He had 69 receptions for 886 yards and 11 touchdowns on the season, earning first team All-CAA honors and helping lead the Wildcats to the semifinal round of the FCS playoffs. White was a two-time all-league honoree, as he was later named to the All-CAA third team as a senior in 2012.

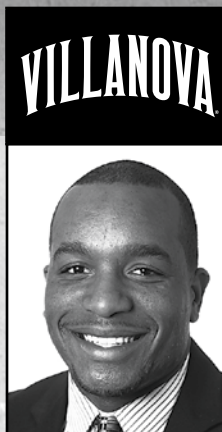
Villanova reached the pinnacle of college football in 2009 when the program won its first national title. Flinn coached wide receiver Matt Szczur to numerous honors that season, and Szczur was selected as the Most Outstanding Player in the FCS national championship game when the Wildcats defeated Montana, 23-21. Szczur was the CAA Football Offensive Player of the Year in 2009, in addition to earning first team All-CAA recognition and being a consensus first team All-American.

A native of Youngstown, Ohio, Flinn arrived at Villanova from Eastern Illinois where he served as an assistant coach from 2002-05. In addition to coaching the wide receivers and tight ends at Eastern Illinois, he was also the school's pass game coordinator and recruiting coordinator.

Flinn also has coaching experience at the University of Maryland (graduate assistant, 2001-02), Drake University (wide receivers, 2000), and Mount Union College (linebackers, 1999/wide receivers, 1998).

As a player, Flinn was an All-Ohio Athletic Conference tight end at Mount Union College where he was part of Division III National Championship teams in 1993 and 1996. While at Mount Union, he earned a double major in Business Administration and Philosophy in 1997.

Flinn and his wife Sheri reside in Fairless Hills, Pa., with their 10-year-old son, Austin and eight-year old daughter, Shayne.

CORNERBACKS COACH • 3rd Season**

Ola Adams begins his third year with the Wildcats in 2017, and will be in his first season as the team's Special Teams Coordinator and cornerbacks coach. He worked with the Villanova running backs for the past two seasons. From a recruiting standpoint, Adams handles a number of local high schools in addition to the Maryland and Washington, D.C. area primarily and North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia and West Virginia nationally. He was also serve as the program's pro liaison.

Adams coached All-CAA running backs in each of his first two seasons on the Main Line. Sophomore Aaron Forbes was a third team selection in 2016 after leading the team with 799 rushing yards and eight touchdowns. Forbes had a pair of 100-yard games, including a career-high 151 rushing yards and two touchdowns in a win over Albany. He also had one receiving touchdown on the year and led Villanova with 54 points. Senior running back Gary Underwood was a first team All-CAA selection and an All-ECAC honoree in 2015 during Adams' first year with the Wildcats.

He came to Villanova from Columbia University where he was the wide receivers coach in 2014. Prior to his year at Columbia, Adams was the Assistant Head Coach and Defensive Coordinator at Cortland State. During his three years at Cortland, the Red Dragons tallied a 24-9 overall record and earned a NCAA playoff bid in 2012. In 2013, his defense ranked in the top 30 nationally in six different categories, while in 2011 his defense was ranked nationally in the top 35 in eight separate categories. Prior to spending one seasons (2010) as the secondary coach at Glensville State College, Adams had his first stint at Cortland as the defensive backs coach in 2009. He began his coaching career as the assistant defensive backs coach at Concord University in 2008.

Adams has also participated in the NFL minority internship program. In 2014, he was the minority intern for defense (secondary) for the San Francisco 49ers, while in 2013 he served as the minority internship with the Chicago Bears (defensive line). Also, in 2013, he participated in the NFL Coaching Academy.

As a player, Adams was a four-year starter at Concord University where he was the No. 7 rated Division II free safety in 2008. Adams, who earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in Recreation and Tourism Management in 2008, also ran track at Concord and was the 2006 WVIAC triple jump runner-up.

One of the veteran members of the Villanova coaching staff, David Riede is in his 11th season with the Wildcats in 2017 and will be team's Recruiting Coordinator in addition to working with the team's safeties. Riede will specifically recruit several local schools in Chester County as well as Pennsylvania districts 3, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10, in addition to nationally in Arizona, California, Hawaii, Nevada and Utah.

Riede has held several roles on the staff during

his time at Villanova, and was most recently the cornerbacks coach for the last seven seasons and the program's Director of Player Personnel for eight years. Riede came to Villanova from Allegheny College where he was an assistant from 2005-07. During his stay at Allegheny, Riede was responsible for coaching the wide receivers and overseeing all aspects of video coordination.

During his playing days at Baldwin Wallace, he was a two-year letterwinner in football and a three-year letterwinner in baseball. 	BRIAN JONES RUNNING BACKS COACH • 1st Season
	<p>Brian Jones is a newcomer to the Villanova coaching staff in 2017, although he is no stranger to the program after having been a member of the original Wildcats staff from 1984-87 when Andy Talley started to rebuild the program. Jones will work with the Villanova running backs and will recruit in several local areas, as well as in New York (Sections 1, 2, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11) and nationally in Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota, Missouri and Wisconsin.</p>

Jones made a name for himself during more than two decades of coaching running backs at the FBS level. He spent 16 seasons at Missouri, where he was in charge of a Tigers running game that produced a 1,000-yard rusher seven times in a 10-year span beginning in 2006. He worked with senior tailback Russell Hansbrough during the 2014 season, when Hansbrough ran for 1,084 yards. Hansbrough also rushed for 685 yards and four scores in 2013, when Missouri ranked 16th among all FBS teams with an average of 237.4 yards per game on the ground.

Henry Josey was one of the top comeback stories in college football during that 2013 campaign, as he gained 1,166 yards with 16 touchdowns and an average of 6.7 yards per carry one year after sitting out with a severe knee injury. Behind Josey were the duo of Hansbrough and Marcus Murphy, who rushed for 601 yards and nine touchdowns. Josey had been a first team all-conference performer in 2011 when he averaged 116.8 yards per contest to lead a Missouri squad which led the Big 12 with 244.0 rushing yards per game.

The other all-conference performers that Jones coached at Missouri are tailbacks Zack Abron, Tony Temple and Derrick Washington. Abron was a three-time all-league selection during his career, garnering second team honors in 2003 after being an honorable mention pick the year prior and a third team selection in 2001. Temple was an honorable mention All-Big 12 pick in both 2006 and 2007, while Washington was a second team honoree in 2008 and merited honorable mention accolades in 2009.

Jones coached under Gary Pinkel at Toledo from 1992-00, then followed Pinkel to Missouri for the 2001 season. During his last two years at Toledo, the Rockets running attack was ranked in the top 10 in the country. Toledo averaged 253.8 rushing yards per game in 2000 to rank ninth in the nation, while the 1999 squad was 10th nationally with 239.2 yards per game in addition to leading the country with an average of 5.35 yards per attempt.



In 1995, Toledo led the MAC and was fifth in the nation with 244.5 rushing yards per game. The team's starting tailback that season, Wasean Tait, was named the MAC Player of the Year and garnered second team All-America honors after ranking second in the nation in rushing and third in scoring.

Jones began his coaching career as the offensive line coach at RPI from 1983-84, before he came to Villanova as an outside linebackers coach. He also made stops at Massachusetts (1988-91; receivers/outside linebackers) and Lafayette (1991, receivers) before going to Toledo and then on to Missouri. Jones also coached at

Central Methodist College in Missouri in 2016.

As a collegiate student-athlete, Jones was an offensive lineman at Connecticut, where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Marketing in 1980. He also holds a Master of Science degree in Administration and Physical Education from Norwich (1983).

Jones was born in Jamaica and raised in New York City. He and his wife, Mary Kay, are the parents of sons Grant and Brandon, and daughter Aubrey.



	ROSS PENNYPACKER DEFENSIVE LINE COACH • 3rd Season
	<p>A familiar face returns to Villanova in 2017, as Ross Pennypacker joins the coaching staff as the Wildcats defensive line coach. He previously was a graduate assistant and assistant coach for the program from 2006-07. Pennypacker will recruit a number of local schools, and his primary recruiting area will consist of Pennsylvania (Districts 2, 4, 11) and New York (Sections 3, 4, 5, 6). He will also recruit nationally in Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Louisiana and Mississippi.</p>

Pennypacker spent the previous four seasons as the Defensive Coordinator and safeties coach at Kutztown. While coaching the Bears, he mentored 15 defensive players who earned All-PSAC honors. Pennypacker's defenses tallied three shutouts and ranked in the top half of the PSAC in rushing defense and turnover margin. Kutztown led the PSAC in red zone defense in 2014 and ranked in the top three in the league in total defense and turnover margin. Perhaps even more impressively, the Bears were 15-1 during Pennypacker's time on staff when the defense held opponents to fewer than 24 points.

Before his coaching stint at Kutztown, Pennypacker was an assistant coach for three years at Bucknell. He coached the team's linebackers in 2011 and 2012 after guiding the safeties in his first season on the staff. Pennypacker was also the cornerbacks coach at Cornell from 2008-09. He began his coaching career in 2005 at his alma mater, Millersville, where he played and coached under current Villanova defensive coordinator Joe Trainer.

A linebacker as a player, Pennypacker went on to serve as a student assistant and worked with both the outside linebackers and the safeties. He also was an intern assistant at Allegheny College, where he worked with the outside linebackers. During his first stint at Villanova, Pennypacker's duties included serving as the Wildcats video coordinator and assisting with the defensive backs. He helped Villanova to a 6-5 mark in 2006 and a 7-4 record in 2007.

Pennypacker is a 2005 graduate of Millersville with a degree in social sciences. He and his wife, Lisa, reside in Flemington, N.J.

	<p>Sean Devine comes to Villanova for his first season in 2017 and will coach the Wildcats offensive line. In addition to recruiting several local schools in the greater Philadelphia area, Devine's recruiting territory includes Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Vermont on the Eastern seaboard as well as Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas on the national front.</p> <p>A veteran of more than 20 years in the collegiate coaching ranks, Devine spent the past four seasons</p>

as the Offensive Coordinator and offensive line coach at Delaware. He made an immediate mark on the Blue Hens in his first season in 2013, when he worked with one of the top offensive units in CAA Football. Delaware tallied a 7-5 record and ranked in the top half of the league nearly every statistical category, including second in scoring offense (32.8 points per game), third in passing offense (240.0 yards per game) and fourth in rushing offense (177.0 yards per game).

Delaware won six games in 2014 and placed both junior tackle Ben Curtis and senior guard JD Dzurko on the All-CAA squad. Curtis went on to be an All-American in 2015 for a Blue Hens team that ranked second in the CAA and 17th in FCS football in rushing offense (219.4 yards per game). Delaware was also second in the league and 13th nationally in time of possession per game (33:04) in 2015. Devine worked with a pair of offensive linemen, Connor Bozick and Brody Kern, who were All-CAA selections for both the 2015 and the 2016 seasons.

Prior to coming to Villanova, Devine gained experience in CAA Football at both Delaware and New Hampshire. He coached for 14 years (1995-08) at New Hampshire, where he served as defensive line coach (1995-01), offensive line coach and recruiting coordinator (2002-06), and offensive coordinator and offensive line coach (2007-08). Devine was a part of five consecutive FCS playoff berths from 2004-08, and during his time on the Wildcats coaching staff he saw New Hampshire gain a No. 1 national ranking and capture three conference titles. Among the players he coached was quarterback Ricky Santos, who won at least a share of the league's Offensive Player of the Year award three straight years from 2005-07.

Devine began his coaching career at his alma mater, Colby College, in 1994 and also coached for four years at Boston College (2009-12) prior to his stint at Delaware. He served as the offensive line coach at Boston College for three seasons and was also the tight ends coach in 2012. Devine helped lead the Eagles to berths in the Emerald Bowl (2009) and the Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl (2010), and he coached two-time All-ACC performer Anthony Castonzo who was a 2011 first round draft pick by the Indianapolis Colts.

Devine was a four-year starter at linebacker at Colby College, where he was a team captain. He was an All-East selection as a senior and earned his degree in Physics in 1994. He was Colby's defensive line coach for the 1994 football season.

2014 and 2015 seasons. The Greyhounds won a combined 18 games during his two years on the staff, including an 11-2 season in 2015 when the team put together a 10-game winning streak and advanced to the second round of the NCAA playoffs.

He ranked third on the team with 69 tackles as a senior, and his stats for the season also included 5.5 tackles for loss, one fumble recovery, two interceptions, three quarterback hurries and one pass breakup. Colangelo was a Northeast-10 first team All-Conference choice in 2013 and was also named a Worcester Area first team All-Star. He was presented with the 2014 William A. Cating '64 Memorial Award as the "Most Coachable" male athlete at Assumption.

	<p>Nate Pagan comes to Villanova for his first season in 2017 and will be an offensive assistant on the Wildcats coaching staff. FIGHTING FOR A CAUSE — TALLEY'S FIGHT FOR BONE MARROW DONOR PROGRAM

Away from the football field, Villanova University head football coach emeritus Andy Talley is actively involved in numerous community programs, but foremost among his efforts has been Be The Match, an organization operated by the National Marrow Donor Program.

Talley's involvement in this national campaign began in 1992 after hearing the devastating odds facing blood cancer patients in need of a marrow transplant. The odds of finding a lifesaving marrow donor were slim, especially if the patient was that of a minority. Determined to help, Talley raised over \$10,000 for the testing of 200 potential donors, with Villanova football student-athletes and his coaching staff serving as the foundation. As a result of his success, in 1993 he secured a \$60,000 grant and organized the "Football United for Life" campaign, which attracted over 950 potential bone marrow donors. That group included a large number of student-athletes, primarily from the Villanova community, but also from many other Philadelphia-area college football programs.

Now in his 25th year of association with marrow donation, Talley has not only continued to



host his annual marrow donor registry drive, but has turned his local efforts into a nationwide program.

In 2008, Talley officially partnered with Be The Match® to start the "Get in the Game, Save a Life" (GITG) marrow donor registry campaign. Since that time, with the help of almost 80 college football programs from all division levels, over 71,000 new potential donors have been added to the Be The Match Registry. Even more impressive, the GITG program has been responsible for over 300 lifesaving stem cell/marrow transplants in just eight years.

With each GITG donor costing approximately \$100 to register, Talley further supported his commitment to Be The Match and saving lives by founding The Andy Talley Bone Marrow Foundation (ATBMF) in 2010. The ATBMF helps operate the GITG program, as well as hosts fundraising events to help offset GITG costs. To date, Talley has contributed approximately \$350,000 to Be The Match and the GITG program.

After watching three of their own teammates donate during the 2015 football season, and having a father of a player in need of a transplant, the Wildcats were motivated to host a successful spring 2016 drive in April where they registered over 600 new potential donors.

"I am very proud and excited about what our "Get in the Game" program has accomplished," said Talley. "A special thanks goes out to all of the head football coaches and their players that have joined forces with me and adopted the passion of saving lives through marrow transplant. Together we are saving lives."

MATT SZCZUR MAKES BONE MARROW DONATION TO YOUNG PATIENT WITH LEUKEMIA

As a freshman at Villanova in 2007, baseball and football player Matt Szczur joined the registry of the Be The Match Foundation during a drive hosted on campus. Szczur was identified as a match for a leukemia patient several months ago and recently underwent a procedure to donate peripheral blood cells to a 19-month old patient he has never met.

"I was extremely excited when I found out that I was a match for a patient," Szczur said. "When I joined the donor registry I never in a million years thought that I would one day be a match. It is a terrific feeling to have successfully completed the procedure. I was just happy to have this opportunity and I know that anyone else would do the same thing I did if they were given the chance to save someone's life."

Thousands of patients with leukemia and other life-threatening diseases need bone marrow transplants and depend on the Be The Match Registry to find a donor. For a successful transplant, a patient needs a matching

donor. Although there are more than 20 million registered donors, there are still only a few hundred matches found each year.

"There was no doubt in my mind that the procedure was going to be successful for the patient," Szczur said. "I whole-heartedly believe that she is going to be okay and hopefully one day I will be able to meet her and her family. In my heart, I just know that there is a great family out there and it was an honor to have the chance to help a little girl. I can't wait for the day when she is well enough to come to one of my games and see me play."

In preparation for making his donation, Szczur took medication which caused him to miss 10 games during the baseball season. He still wound up leading the team in eight different offensive categories for the year, including batting .443 with a .487 on-base percentage and a .667 slugging percentage. He tallied 13 doubles, seven triples and four home runs and became Villanova's first .400 hitter since 1997. For his efforts, Szczur was named a first team All-BIG EAST selection as well as an All-

East Region pick. He is currently playing in the major leagues with the Chicago Cubs.

Szczur was a two-sport star at Villanova who earned All-America honors as a football player in 2009. He helped lead the Wildcats to their first-ever national championship, as Villanova defeated Montana by a score of 23-21 in the title game of the Division I Football Championship. Szczur ran for a career-high 159 yards against Montana and racked up 270 all-purpose yards on the way to being named MVP of the championship game for his performance.

Villanova football coach Andy Talley is in his 25th year of association with the bone marrow donor program and continues to hold testing drives to get people entered into the national registry. This year's drive was held last April and resulted in over 600 people joining the registry.

Szczur is currently playing in the major leagues with the San Diego Padres.

CONFERENCE **V**





CAA Football has established itself as one of the nation's premier FCS power conferences over the past decade due to its on-field success, broadcast exposure, marketability and the achievements of its student-athletes in the classroom, in the community and at the next level.

James Madison capped an outstanding 2016 season for the conference by capturing the league's sixth FCS national title with a 28-14 victory over Youngstown State. CAA Football sent four programs to the NCAA Division I Football Championship for the third straight season and each of them won at least one playoff game. In addition to the Dukes' national title, New Hampshire extended the nation's longest FCS playoff streak with its 13 straight appearance, Richmond advanced to the FCS quarterfinals for the second year in a row and Villanova earned a playoff berth for the sixth time in nine years.

CAA Football continued its success against non-conference opponents in 2016, finishing 24-7 against FCS foes and 27-18 overall. The mark was the best of any FCS conference. The league posted a pair of victories over FBS competition for the first time since 2013 as Richmond knocked off ACC member Virginia, 37-20, and UAlbany defeated Buffalo, 22-16. CAA Football teams have now recorded 34 wins over FBS opponents in its history.

A strong presence in the national rankings remained another constant for CAA Football in 2016. James Madison finished the year as the unanimous #1 team in the country, while Richmond, Villanova and New Hampshire were also ranked in the final FCS top 25 polls. Eleven different CAA teams were either ranked or receiving votes in the national polls at some point during the 2016 season.

A total of 20 CAA Football players were named to one or more All-America teams in 2016, led by consensus first-team All-America selections, offensive lineman Mitchell Kirsch of James Madison and defensive lineman Tanoh Kpassagnon of Villanova. In addition, Towson's Jake Ryder was chosen to the FCS ADA Academic All-America team.

CAA Football continues to provide a path to the next level, with two players selected in the 2017 NFL Draft. Kpassagnon was drafted in the second round (59th overall) by the Kansas City Chiefs and Villanova offensive lineman Brad

Seaton went to the Tennessee Titans in round seven. The conference has now had multiple players picked in each NFL Draft since 2006.

CAA Football reached a national audience last fall with 30 regular-season games televised by various outlets. In addition, numerous others were distributed on CAA.tv. In 2015, the CAA's national appeal was showcased when ESPN's iconic College Gameday aired live from James Madison on Oct. 24 prior to the Dukes' conference showdown with Richmond. It marked the show's first trip to a CAA campus.

CAA Football's emphasis on its players' off-the-field achievements was evident again in 2016. New Hampshire's Casey DeAndrade was the recipient of the Chuck Boone Leadership Award, which honors the player who best embodies the highest standards of leadership, integrity, teamwork and sportsmanship in his academic and athletic pursuits. Towson's Jake Ryder and New Hampshire's Cam Shorey were selected as CAA Football's Student-Athlete of the Year.

Showing a desire to unite behind a common cause, all 12 CAA Football schools partnered with the Be the Match Foundation and its "Get in the Game, Save a Life" program in 2016. Former Villanova coach Andy Talley has been a driving force nationally for the program, which raises awareness of the need for bone marrow donors.

CAA Football has enjoyed a tremendous record in the postseason, earning 98 total playoff berths and at least three in every year since 2006. The league's 99 all-time wins in the NCAA playoffs are second-most of any FCS conference, and the league has further established its presence at the national level by placing 12 teams in the national semifinals over the past 11 seasons.

James Madison's national title in 2016 was the third in the past decade and sixth overall for CAA Football. Villanova captured the 2009 national championship and Richmond claimed its first FCS crown in 2008. In 2004, JMU took home the national championship, becoming the first team since the field expanded to 16 teams in 1986 to reach the final after winning three road playoff games. Delaware rolled past Colgate, 40-0, to capture the first title-game shutout in 2003. Former league member Massachusetts earned a national championship in 1998.

CAA Football boasts a total of 27 individual national award winners in league history. Villanova quarterback John Robertson (2014), Old Dominion quarterback Taylor Heinicke (2012), New Hampshire quarterback Ricky Santos (2006), William & Mary quarterback Lang Campbell (2004), Villanova running back Brian Westbrook (2001), Nova wide receiver Brian Finneran (1997), UNH running back Jerry Azumah (1998) and Towson running back

Dave Meggett (1998) all earned the Walter Payton Award as the top offensive player in FCS under the league banner. UNH linebacker Matt Evans (2011), James Madison defensive lineman Arthur Moats (2009), and JMU linebacker Derrick Lloyd (2001) each received the Buck Buchanan Award as the top defensive player in FCS. Robertson (2012) and Towson's Terrance West (2011) are past recipients of the Jerry Rice Award as the top freshman in FCS. New Hampshire's Sean McDonnell (2005 and 2014), Towson's Rob Ambrose (2011), JMU's Mickey Matthews (1999 and 2008), Villanova's Andy Talley (1997) and Boston University's Dan Allen (1993) are past Eddie Robinson Award winners from the league as the top coach in FCS. JMU's Mike Houston (2016), McDonnell (2014), Matthews (2004), Talley (1997 and 2009), Delaware's K.C. Keeler (2010), Richmond's Mike London (2008), and Massachusetts' Mark Whipple (1998) have all garnered the AFCA National Coach of the Year honor as well.

The league remains successful beyond the collegiate playing field. CAA Football has had 113 players drafted by NFL franchises dating back to 1948. A total of 35 players have been selected in the draft over the last 12 years, including 2013 Super Bowl MVP Joe Flacco of Delaware (18th overall to the Baltimore Ravens in 2008). More than 30 players currently join Flacco on active NFL rosters.

CAA Football's geographic footprint extends up and down the East Coast, with schools located from Maine to North Carolina. Members include UAlbany, Delaware, Elon, James Madison, Maine, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Richmond, Stony Brook, Towson, Villanova and William and Mary. Joe D'Antonio begins his second year as commissioner of CAA Football and the Colonial Athletic Association.

While CAA Football officially began March 1, 2007, its roots date back more than 60 years. On December 3, 1946, the Code of the Yankee Conference went into effect. Established as an all-sports conference for the New England land grant colleges, the six charter members included Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Vermont. Upon the formation of Division I-AA football in 1978, the league disbanded all sports except for football. Delaware and Richmond were admitted to the conference in 1986, Villanova was added in 1988 and James Madison, Northeastern and William and Mary joined the league in 1993. The Atlantic 10 assumed operational control of the conference from 1997-2006, with Hofstra becoming part of the league in 2001 and Towson joining the group in 2004. With the conference under the CAA Football banner, UAlbany and Stony Brook were welcomed in 2013, followed by Elon in 2014.

ATLANTIC 10 CONFERENCE HISTORY

2017

Villanova became a member of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference in 1997, ending a 10-year membership in the Yankee Conference when that league's 50-year football legacy came to a close. Following the 2006 season, the 12 members of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference officially joined the Colonial Athletic Association.

From 1997 through the 2006 season, the Atlantic 10 held the distinction of being the premier conference in I-AA football. The league produced national champions in both 2003 and 2004 and the 2006 season marked the 16th consecutive year that the A-10 received multiple postseason berths.

In 2006, the conference automatic bid was awarded to Massachusetts after the team won the North Division with a perfect 8-0 league record. Massachusetts advanced to the national championship game, while both New Hampshire and James Madison reached the NCAA Tournament as well. New Hampshire quarterback Ricky Santos became the fifth player in the history of the league to win the Walter Payton Award, presented each year to the most outstanding player in I-AA. In addition, the league had 15 players earn All-America honors in 2006 and three were chosen to play in the East-West Shrine game.

The 2005 season marked the 15th consecutive season that the A-10 received multiple postseason berths as New Hampshire and Richmond advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA playoffs. Eight teams appeared in the national rankings during the 2005 season and 13 different players earned All-America honors, including New Hampshire quarterback Ricky Santos, who was runner-up in the voting for the prestigious Walter Payton Award. It marked the sixth consecutive year that an Atlantic 10 student-athlete finished in the top three in the voting. In addition, Villanova's Brian Hulea and Shannon James of Massachusetts were finalists for the Buck Buchanan Award, presented to the top defensive player in I-AA.

For the fourth time in league annals, the Eddie Robinson Award was presented to a head coach in the Conference as Sean McDonnell of New Hampshire became the 19th recipient of the award in 2005. Presented annually by The Sports Network to the most outstanding coach in I-AA, McDonnell guided UNH to an 11-2 record and the program's first-ever No. 1 ranking. He joins current head coaches Andy Talley of Villanova (1997) and James Madison's Mickey Matthews (1999) and former Boston University coach Dan Allen (1993) as recipients of the Eddie Robinson Award, giving the Atlantic

10 the distinction of being the only league with three current head coaches who have won the prestigious honor.

In 2004, James Madison claimed the national championship with a 31-21 win over Montana and in the process became the first program to reach the championship game by winning three road playoff games since the field expanded to 16 teams in 1986. With Delaware registering the lone shutout in the 29-year history of the championship en route to capturing the 2003 crown, the Atlantic 10 became the first Conference to have two different teams win the title in consecutive seasons. Massachusetts defeated Georgia Southern, 55-43, to claim the 1998 title.

What set the Atlantic 10 Football Conference apart from other leagues is that its success was not limited to select institutions. In 2004, Delaware and James Madison were joined in the 16-team playoff field by New Hampshire and William & Mary, giving the Conference a record four teams in the postseason. Moreover, all four teams advanced to the quarterfinals, a first for any conference. Since the start of the 2001 season, 10 of the league's 12 current members have advanced to the playoffs. Despite long odds, the Atlantic 10 has also enjoyed great triumphs over I-A foes. An A-10 team has defeated a I-A program in six of the last eight seasons, including victories by Maine over Mississippi State and New Hampshire versus Rutgers in 2004.

The A-10 saw five of its student-athletes named the recipient of the Walter Payton Award - New Hampshire quarterback Ricky Santos (2006), William & Mary quarterback Lang Campbell (2004), former Villanova standouts Brian Westbrook (2001) and Brian Finneran (1997) and New Hampshire running back Jerry Azumah (1998). In 2001, linebacker Derrick Lloyd of James Madison became the first A-10 player to win the Buck Buchanan Award, marking the first time in history that the winners of the Walter Payton and Buck Buchanan Awards hailed from the same conference.

The Atlantic 10 Football Conference officially assumed operational control of the Yankee Conference on July 1, 1997, marking the end of a 50-year legacy. Yet a new era began in collegiate football.

Delaware, Hofstra, James Madison, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Northeastern, Rhode Island, Richmond, Towson, Villanova, and William & Mary made up the 12-team membership of the league.

The Atlantic 10 Football Conference traced its roots to December 3, 1946 when the Code of the Yankee Conference went into effect. Originally established as an all-sports conference for the New England land grant colleges, the six charter members of the Yankee Conference included Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Vermont. In 1973, Boston University joined the Conference as its first non-land grant institution.

After the 1974 season, Vermont withdrew from the league. Then, upon the formation of Division I-AA football in 1978, the league disbanded all sports except football. Membership remained stable until 1986 when Delaware and Richmond were admitted. Villanova gained admittance in 1988 and, in 1993, the Conference grew again with James Madison, Northeastern and William & Mary joining the league. Boston University withdrew from the league when it suspended its football program following the 1997 season. Connecticut withdrew following the 1999 season and Hofstra was added beginning with the 2001 campaign. Towson played its first season of Atlantic 10 Football Conference competition in 2004.

By moving to the Atlantic 10 Conference for the 1997 season, Villanova University's nine-year membership of the Yankee Conference and the conference's 50-year football legacy came to a close. Under the direction of head coach Andy Talley, Villanova compiled a life-time mark of 38-31 in Yankee Conference contests. During their Yankee Conference history, the Wildcats shared the league championship twice, 1991 and 1989, finished second on three occasions, in 1996, 1992 and 1990, and third once in 1988.

The addition of three college football programs in 1993 (James Madison, Northeastern and William and Mary) made the Yankee Conference the largest NCAA Division I-AA conference, with 12 total members. Each one of the 12 schools competed for the conference title, playing an eight-game league slate. For scheduling purposes only, the league was divided into a New England Division (Boston University, University of Connecticut, University of Maine, University of Massachusetts, University of New Hampshire and the University of Rhode Island), and a Mid-Atlantic Division (University of Delaware, James Madison University, Northeastern University, University of Richmond, VILLANOVA UNIVERSITY and the College of William and Mary). Also, each individual school had to play each team in its own division, as well as three teams from the other division each year for a total of eight league contests.

The Yankee Conference originally developed from the New England College Conference of Intercollegiate Athletics. When Northeastern University offered its resignation from that group, the Land Grant institutions appointed a committee to form a new league. On December 8, 1945, that committee recommended an athletic confer-

ence formed by the six New England Land Grant colleges, namely; the University of Connecticut, University of Maine, Massachusetts State College (now the University of Massachusetts), Rhode Island State College (now the University of Rhode Island), the University of New Hampshire and the University of Vermont.

On August 24, 1946, representatives from the schools met. A preamble and code of the Yankee Conference were adopted, and became effective on December 3, 1946. The first league champion-

ships were conducted in the 1947-48 season.

In 1978, with the creation by the NCAA of Division I-AA Football, the Yankee Conference disbanded in all sports with the exception of football. Vermont, which had dropped football in 1974, dropped out of the league. As a result, the Yankee Conference, after already adding Boston University in 1973, was six members strong.

In 1984, the University of Delaware and University of Richmond joined the league, and became eligible for the league title in 1986, while the Villanova University Wildcats came on board in 1985. They became eligible for the league title in 1988.

The Yankee Conference was one of the original conferences to receive an automatic bid to the NCAA Division I-AA Playoffs in 1978. Since the birth of NCAA Division I-AA, Boston University went to the playoffs five times (1980, 1982, 1983, 1984, 1994); Rhode Island three times (1981, 1984, 1985); Massachusetts three times (1978, 1988, 1990); Delaware six times (1986, 1988, 1991, 1992, 1995, 1996); Villanova four times (1989, 1991, 1992, 1996); Maine twice (1987, 1989); New Hampshire twice (1991, 1994); James Madison twice (1994, 1995), William & Mary twice (1993-1996) and Richmond (1987) once.

Johnny Wysocki was a member of the Villanova team that played Auburn to a 7-7 tie in the Bacardi Bowl on January 1, 1937.

NOVEMBER 22, 1894: Villanova College's first football game, a 24-0 victory over the Logan Athletic Association.

NOVEMBER 13, 1895: Villanova's first "intercollegiate" football game, a 12-0 win over Hahneman College.

OCTOBER 8, 1927: Opening day at Villanova Stadium. After the dedication ceremonies, the Wildcats celebrate by winning the first game at their new home, a 32-7 victory over Lebanon Valley College.

SEPTEMBER 28, 1928: Sophomore football player Leo J. Goodreau suffers severe injury during football practice.

OCTOBER 2, 1928: Sophomore football player Leo J. Goodreau dies as a result of injuries suffered during practice.

MAY 7, 1930: Members of Leo J. Goodreau's class dedicate the playing field in Villanova Stadium to his memory.

JANUARY 1, 1937: Villanova and Auburn play to a 7-7 tie in the first, and only, Bacardi Bowl in Havana, Cuba.

DECEMBER 6, 1947: The Kentucky Wildcats beat the Villanova Wildcats, 24-14, in the Great Lakes Bowl in Cleveland's Municipal Stadium.

JANUARY 1, 1949: Villanova beats Nevada, 27-7, in the Harbor Bowl in San Diego's Balboa Stadium.

SEPTEMBER 23, 1950: Pete D'Alonzo carries the ball 23 times for 201 yards in a 39-28 season-opening Villanova victory against Duquesne. His yardage will stand as the single-game leader for 41 years.

OCTOBER 31, 1952: First night game at Villanova Stadium, under portable lights. Wildcats battle to a 20-20 tie against the Parris Island Marines.

NOVEMBER 4, 1961: Villanova beats West Chester, 40-13, in the first game ever televised from Villanova Stadium. The game is carried live on Philadelphia's Channel 3, then known as WRCV-TV.

DECEMBER 30, 1961: The Wildcats shock the Wichita Shockers in the Sun Bowl, at Kidd Field in El Paso. The 'Cats collect a 17-9 victory. It's remembered as one of the greatest days in Villanova athletic history, for later that day the Wildcat men's basketball team won the Quaker City Tournament in Philadelphia.

DECEMBER 15, 1962: The 'Cats lose to Oregon State, 6-0, in the Liberty Bowl at Philadelphia's Municipal Stadium, in their last bowl game appearance. Later that day, the Wildcat men's basketball team loses to Niagara at the Palestra, 73-61. Rich Richman plays in both games for the Wildcats, as a quarterback at Municipal Stadium, and off the bench as a forward at the Palestra.

SEPTEMBER 27, 1969: "One of the most dramatic comebacks in college football's 101 years," claimed Philadelphia Bulletin writer Frank Brady. The Wildcats trailed at Delaware by 26 points three minutes into the final period, when quarterback Drew Gordon came in off the bench to hit 7-of-17 passes for 127 yards and three touchdowns. Villanova beat Delaware, 36-33.

SEPTEMBER 27, 1980: Villanova Stadium is re-dedicated, after installation of astroturf, lights and a new track. At halftime of the Boston College-Villanova contest, the track is dedicated to legendary track coach James "Jumbo" Elliott. The Wildcats win the game, 20-9.

APRIL 14, 1981: Villanova's board of trustees elects to discontinue football, citing economic reasons.

DECEMBER 1, 1981: The Committee to Restore Football at Villanova hosts their first benefit, featuring Bob Hope at the Academy of Music in Philadelphia. The night is nicknamed, "Hope for Football."

NOVEMBER 3, 1982: Villanova's student government released results from a student survey, showing 96.07 percent of students responding want football back.

DECEMBER 14, 1982: Villanova board of trustees agrees to review its position on football.

DECEMBER 13, 1983: Villanova President John M. Driscoll, O.S.A. announces that the board of trustees has elected to restore football.

MAY 29, 1984: The task of rebuilding Villanova Football is placed on the shoulders of Andrew J. Talley, the 30th football head coach in Wildcat history.

OCTOBER 10, 1984: Villanova announces it will be a member of the NCAA Division I-AA Yankee Conference.

NOVEMBER 3, 1984: A sold-out Villanova Stadium crowd of 13,400 is on hand for the first Villanova University football Homecoming game since 1980, a Blue-White scrimmage. Comprised of walk-ons who worked out for one month, the blue team beats the white, 23-7.

SEPTEMBER 2, 1985: Villanova beats Iona, 27-7, and goes on to a 5-0-0 season back on the gridiron.

NOVEMBER 19, 1987: A sold-out Villanova Stadium is on hand for a nationally-televised ESPN clash with Holy Cross, the first night game at Villanova Stadium since 1952. The 'Cats lose to Holy Cross, 39-6.

SEPTEMBER 24, 1988: Villanova beats Boston University, 31-24, in a day of firsts. The game, played at Boston University's Nickerson Field, is Villanova's first in the Yankee Conference. It's also Villanova's first overtime game. Tied 24-24 at the end of regulation, the Wildcats had possession of the ball first in overtime. On fourth and goal the 'Cats fake a field goal, as holder Bob Brady found tight end Rich Lage alone in the endzone for the score. Villanova's defense then held the Terriers in their possession, to win the game.

OCTOBER 7, 1989: It took 3 hours and 40 minutes, but Villanova captured a 41-35 victory in six overtimes against Connecticut at Villanova Stadium. The game was won on Villanova's fourth play of possession in the sixth extra frame, as freshman Jeff Johnson ran for three yards off left tackle for the game winning touchdown.

NOVEMBER 25, 1989: Playing in the post-season for the first time in 27 years, Villanova loses to eventual National Champion Georgia Southern, 52-36, in the first round of the NCAA Division I-AA Playoffs.

OCTOBER 26, 1991: Pat Kennedy rushed for 249 yards and four touchdowns on 21 carries against William & Mary, in a 35-21 Villanova victory. It's the second greatest game ever by a Villanova running back.

NOVEMBER 30, 1991: Villanova loses to eventual National Champion Youngstown State, 17-16, in the first round of the NCAA Division I-AA Playoffs.

NOVEMBER 28, 1992: Making it to the NCAA Division I-AA Playoffs for the third time in four years, the Wildcats lose at Youngstown State, 23-20.

SEPTEMBER 30, 1995: Head coach Andy Talley sets new Villanova standard for most all-time coaching victories on the Main Line, earning his 66th win in a 28-3 drubbing of Buffalo.

OCTOBER 5, 1996: Villanova defeats Connecticut 38-27 in Storrs, Conn. The win marked the 100th career victory for Wildcat

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head coach Andy Talley. Also in the game, junior wide receiver Brian Finneran tallies a school record 16 receptions.

NOVEMBER 30, 1996: Villanova loses, 35-29, at East Tennessee State in the first round of the NCAA I-AA playoffs. In the loss, junior running back Curtis Sifford becomes the first Wildcat back to rush for 1,000 yards in a season.

JULY 1, 1997: Villanova becomes a member of the Atlantic 10 Conference who takes over the day-to-day operations of the Yankee Conference.

OCTOBER 4, 1997: Senior wide receiver Brian Finneran becomes Villanova's all-time leading receiver for career receptions and career receiving yards versus JMU. In the win, Finneran tallied eight receptions for 144 yards and four touchdowns.

OCTOBER 20, 1997: Villanova gains No. 1 national ranking for the first time in school history. The 'Cats reached the top spot in both the Sports Network and ESPN/Sportsticker polls.

NOVEMBER 22, 1997: The Wildcats complete the first-ever undefeated, untied full season in school history with a 49-35 win over Northeastern.

NOVEMBER 29, 1997: Hosting the first-ever post season game at Villanova Stadium, the Wildcats record their first NCAA I-AA playoff victory with a 49-28 win over Colgate.

DECEMBER 1, 1997: Head coach Andy Talley and wide receiver Brian Finneran make national headlines, as Talley earns the Eddie Robinson Award as the top I-AA coach in the country and Finneran garners the Walter Payton Award, symbolizing the best player in I-AA.

NOVEMBER 21, 1998: In a 27-15 win over Rhode Island, sophomore Brian Westbrook became the first player in the history of college football at any level to rush for 1,000 yards and receive for 1,000 yards in the same season.

OCTOBER 30, 1999: Head Coach Andy Talley records his 100th victory at Villanova with a 31-28 victory over the University of New Hampshire.

NOVEMBER 24, 2001: Running back Brian Westbrook becomes the all-time leader in the history of college football at any level for career all-purpose yards with a 46-yard rush in the second quarter versus William & Mary in Williamsburg, Va. Westbrook finished his illustrious Villanova career with 9,512 yards of all-purpose offense in 44 regular season games.

DECEMBER 20, 2001: Brian Westbrook wins the Walter Payton Award as the top player in NCAA I-AA football at a banquet in Chattanooga, Tenn.

APRIL 20, 2002: Brian Westbrook becomes the first Wildcat to be drafted by the NFL since Howie Long in 1981 when he was selected in the third round by the Philadelphia Eagles.

AUGUST 31, 2002: In the season opener in Piscataway, N.J., Villanova defeats Rutgers by a score of 37-19, giving the Wildcats their first win over a Division I-AA opponent since becoming a I-AA program in 1985.

DECEMBER 7, 2002: Quarterback Brett Gordon completes 26-of-30 for 219 yards and two touchdowns as Villanova earns a 24-10 quarterfinal win over Fordham and advances to the semifinal round of the NCAA I-AA Playoffs for the first time in school history.

SEPTEMBER 6, 2003: Villanova defeats Temple, 23-20 in overtime, becoming the first Division I-AA school to defeat a I-A team from a BCS conference in back-to-back seasons since the Bowl Championship Series was formed in 1998. The game was also the first regular season football game of any kind to be played at Lincoln Financial Field in Philadelphia, Pa.

MAY 6, 2006: Villanova honors the history of Wildcat football by hosting the Gridiron Gala. More than 300 people attended the on-campus event including Wildcat legends Howie Long, Billy Joe, Brian Finneran and Brian Westbrook.

JULY 1, 2007: Villanova becomes a member of the Colonial Athletic Association who takes over the day-to-day operations of the Atlantic 10 Conference.

NOVEMBER 8, 2008: The Wildcats defeat New Hampshire by a score of 24-13 making head coach Andy Talley the all-time winningest coach in CAA history.

DECEMBER 18, 2009: Villanova wins its first-ever National Championship in football with a 23-21 victory over previously undefeated Montana in a game played at Finley Stadium in Chattanooga, Tenn. Junior Matt Szczur led the Wildcats with a career-high 159 yards rushing and 270 all-purpose yards en route to being named the game's Most Outstanding Player.

APRIL 29, 2011: Wildcat offensive tackle Ben Ijalana is selected by the Indianapolis Colts in the second round of the NFL Draft with the 49th overall pick.

DECEMBER 17, 2012: Redshirt freshman quarterback John Robertson wins the Jerry Rice Award at a banquet held in Philadelphia. The Rice Award is given to the top freshman in FCS Football.

SEPTEMBER 28, 2013: Wildcat head coach Andy Talley records his 200th win at Villanova with a 35-6 victory over the visiting Penn Quakers. Talley becomes the 37th coach in all divisions of college football to win 200 games at one school, and just the eighth active head coach with that distinction.

DECEMBER 15, 2014: At a banquet at the Sheraton Society Hill in Philadelphia, junior quarterback John Robertson wins the Walter Payton Award which is given to the top player in FCS Football. Robertson becomes the third Villanova player to win the Payton Award, with all three winners playing different positions. Wide receiver Brian Finneran won the award in 1997 and running back Brian Westbrook earned the honor in 2001. Villanova is now the only school to have three Walter Payton Award winners.

OCTOBER 21, 2016: Villanova University dedicates the Andrew J. Talley Athletic Center with a ribbon cutting ceremony. The Talley Center will be home to the Wildcats football program and contains several amenities that will benefit every student-athlete on campus.

DECEMBER 3, 2016: The illustrious career of head football coach Andy Talley comes to a close with a 10-7 loss at South Dakota State in the second round of the FCS playoffs. Talley finished his 32-year Villanova career with an all-time record of 230-137-1.

Brian Finneran is one of just two wide receivers to ever win the Walter Payton Award.

At the 11th Annual Division I-AA National Football Awards Banquet held on Dec. 1, 1997, at the Official All-Star Cafe in New York City, Villanova University senior wide receiver Brian Finneran (Mission Viejo, Calif.) won the Walter Payton Award given to the top player in I-AA.

Finneran had a storybook career on the Main Line from 1994-97, and was one of the nation's finest players throughout his four years. During his storied career, he caught 265 passes for 3,872 yards and 34 touchdowns. Finneran currently holds 14 Villanova school records including the career marks for receptions, yards and touchdowns.

Arriving on the Main Line in 1994 from Mission Viejo, Calif., along with his twin brother and fellow Wildcat football standout Brad, Brian Finneran was on a mission. He immediately began to turn heads as a freshman in 1994, catching 56 passes for 805 yards and seven scores. Finneran set Wildcat class records for most catches and yards receiving in a season by a freshman. For his performance, he was named to the All-Yankee Conference second team.

Missing the first two games of his sophomore season due to a separated shoulder, Finneran returned slowly but still caught 32 passes for 471 yards on the year.

Finneran's real breakout season came in 1996, when as a junior, he posted 81 receptions for 1,207 yards and eight touchdowns. The honors came from everywhere, as he received first team All-Atlantic 10, All-ECAC, and All-American honors.

His top campaign would come one year later, as a senior, when he took both himself and the Wildcats to the status of one of the nation's best. With a perfect 11-0 regular season, Villanova was No. 1 in the country and posted the first-ever undefeated, untied full regular season in school history. Despite losing a 37-34 heartbreaker to Youngstown State in the second round of the NCAA Division I-AA

Playoffs, the season was a memorable one for Finneran and the 'Cats. Finneran finished the year with 96 catches for 1,389 yards and 19 touchdowns. He capped off his career by earning the Walter Payton Award, given to the nation's top Division I-AA player.

Finneran played 12 years in the NFL, including 10 seasons with the Atlanta Falcons from 2000-10.

BRIAN WESTBROOK**2001 WALTER PAYTON AWARD WINNER**

For his efforts in 2001, Brian Westbrook became the second Villanova Wildcat to claim the Walter Payton Award.

Villanova University senior running back Brian Westbrook closed out his illustrious collegiate career in fine fashion on December 20, 2001, when he was awarded the Walter Payton Award given annually to the National Player of the Year in NCAA I-AA football. Westbrook received the award at a banquet held in Chattanooga, Tennessee. The other two finalists for the award included Rocky Butler of Hofstra University and Adrian Peterson of Georgia Southern.

Westbrook received 31 first-place votes and 320 points from the panel of 103 I-AA sports information directors and selected media. Following Westbrook in the voting were Hofstra's Rocky Butler, who earned 22 first place votes and 267 total points, and Georgia Southern's Adrian Peterson, who finished in the top three of the voting for the fourth consecutive year.

Westbrook became the second player from Villanova to win the award. In 1997, former Wildcat and current Atlanta Falcon wide receiver Brian Finneran garnered the award.

In 11 games in 2001, Westbrook led all of NCAA I-AA in both All-purpose yards with 2,823 and scoring with 176 points (29 TDs). The 5-9, 205 pound Westbrook rushed 249 times for 1,603 yards and 22 scores, caught 59 passes for 658 yards and

six touchdowns, returned 17 kickoffs for 440 yards and a score, in addition to returning 12 punts for 90 yards during the 2001 campaign. In Villanova's season finale at William & Mary on Nov. 24, Westbrook set the NCAA All-Divisions career all-purpose yards record with 9,512 yards in 44 regular season games.

As a junior in 2000, Westbrook finished third in the Walter Payton Award voting behind Louis Ivory of Furman University who won the award and Peterson who finished second.

The most decorated player in school history, Westbrook finished his Wildcat career with 41 school records, 19 Atlantic 10 Conference marks and five NCAA records. Westbrook became the first player in the history of Villanova football to earn first team All-American honors in three different seasons, when he earned first team All-American acclaim from both *The Sports Network* and the AFCA in 2001. As a sophomore in 1998, Westbrook became the only player in the history of college football at any level to rush for 1,000 yards and receive for 1,000 yards in the same season.

Westbrook played for the Philadelphia Eagles from 2002-09, and with the San Francisco 49ers during the 2010 season.

JOHN ROBERTSON

2014 WALTER PAYTON AWARD WINNER

Junior quarterback John Robertson became the third Villanova Wildcat to win the Walter Payton Award as the top player in FCS Football when he was presented with the prestigious award at the FCS Awards Banquet on Dec. 15, 2014, during a banquet at the Sheraton Society Hill in Philadelphia.

Robertson earned 467 points and 66 first place votes in voting

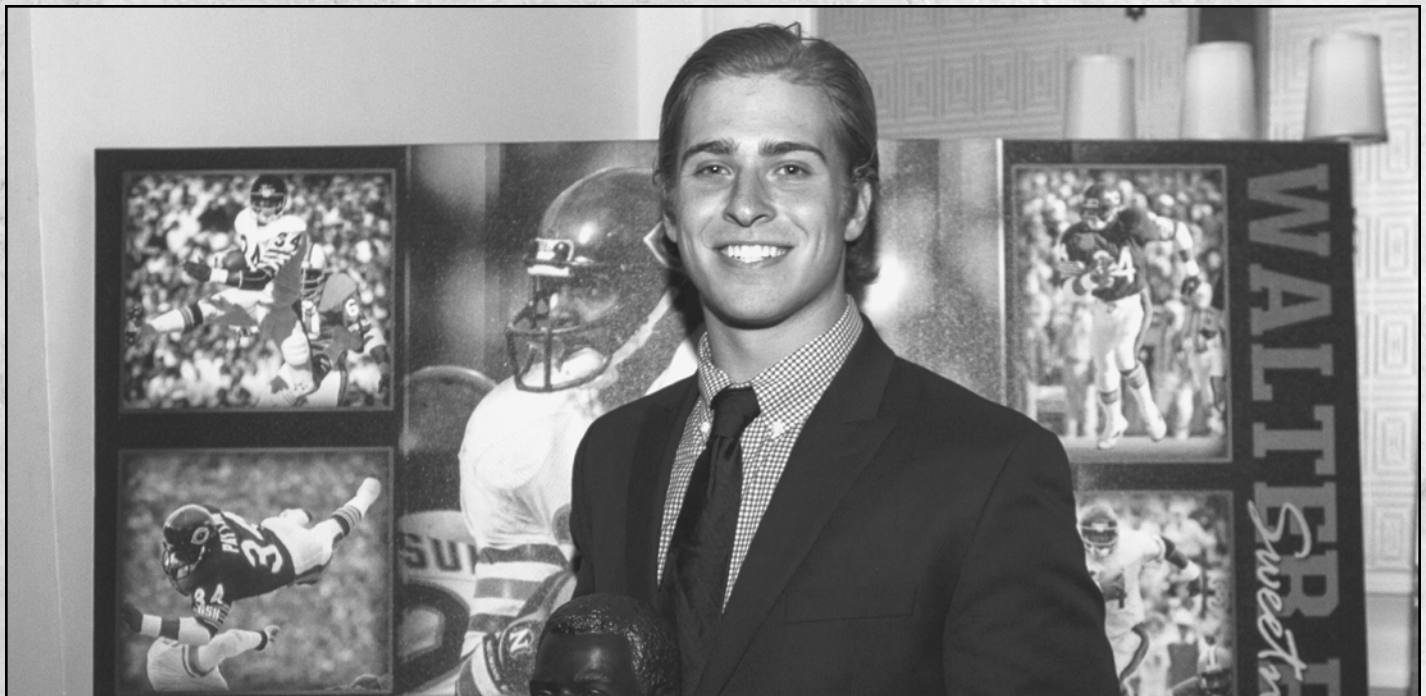
by a nationwide panel of sports information directors, broadcasters, writers and other dignitaries from the division. Eastern Washington quarterback Vernon Adams finished second in the balloting (383 points, 29 first-place votes), while Idaho State signal caller Justin Arias was third with 220 points and 22 first-place votes.

Robertson becomes the third Villanova player to win the Payton Award, with all three winners playing different positions. Wide receiver Brian Finneran won the award in 1997 and running back Brian Westbrook earned the honor in 2001. Villanova is now the only school to have three Walter Payton Award winners.

Robertson finished the 2014 season by completing 197-of-301 passes (65.4%) with 35 touchdowns and three interceptions. He also had 227 carries for a team-high 1,078 yards and 11 scores. Robertson joins Westbrook (1997-2001) as the only two Villanova players to have three 1,000 yard rushing seasons. In seven of his 13 games this year, Robertson threw at least three touchdown passes.

In the NCAA statistics, Robertson ranked in the top two in five different categories. He led all FCS players in passing efficiency (181.3), points responsible for (280) and points responsible for per game, (21.5) and he ranked second in passing touchdowns (35) and passing yards per attempt (9.46).

Robertson finished his Villanova career with a 27-11 record as the starting quarterback by completing 561-of-875 (64.1%) for 7,290 yards to go with 65 touchdowns and 18 interceptions. He ended his Main Line career as the school's record holder for career total offense with 10,933 yards. He also ranks second in program history in career rushing yards with 3,643 and he is fourth in passing yards with 7,290. Robertson owns three of the top nine single season best rushing totals, including his 1,405 yards in 2013 which ranks as the second best rushing effort in the history of Villanova Football.

1937 BARCARDI BOWL

VILLANOVA 7, AUBURN 7

Villanova's history in bowl games began in 1937, when the Wildcats were invited to participate in the 1937 contest which eventually became known as the Bacardi Bowl.

Not only was it Villanova's first football bowl game appearance, but it was also the first bowl game to be played outside the United States. The 'Cats opponent, Auburn University, had rolled up an impressive 7-2-2 record and had closed out the regular season with impressive wins over Loyola, 44-0, and Florida, 13-0, their fifth and sixth shutout wins of the season. Villanova, under coaching great Maurice "Clipper" Smith, piled up a sterling 7-2 record, and had earned victories over the likes of Penn State, Boston University, Detroit and South Carolina. Like Auburn, Villanova boasted of an outstanding defense, one that had recorded four shutouts and had not allowed any opponent more than seven points.

Played in Havana, Cuba as the climactic event of Cuba's National Sports Festival, the game almost never came to be because of a bloodless revolution led by Fulgencio Batista, who, over 20 years later, would be overthrown by Fidel Castro.

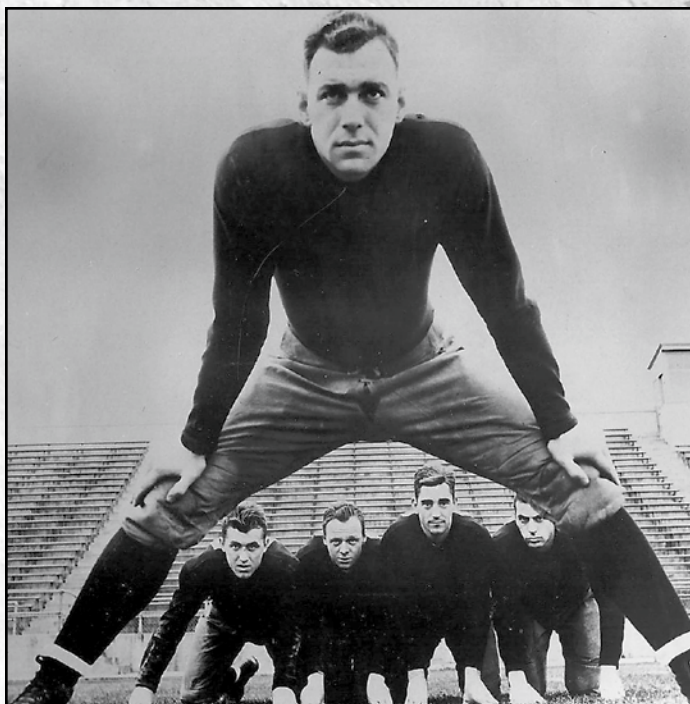
Yet the game went on, and it was Auburn which flexed its muscles first in the contest. The Tigers mounted an offensive attack that saw the ball pushed to the Villanova 10-yard line. But the 'Cats defense stiffened and took over the ball on downs. Unable to do much offensively, Villanova punted the ball away, and on the ensuing possession, Auburn put together its only scoring drive of the day. The Tigers broke the scoreless tie when halfback Billy Hitchcock broke through the Wildcat defense and rambled 40 yards for a touchdown. The extra point was good, and Auburn had a 7-0 lead.

As expected, the defense of both squads continued to dominate play, and at halftime Auburn still held their lead. Midway through the third period, however, Villanova's offense, behind the direction of Anthony Stopper, drove to Auburn's 12-yard line, but came away scoreless after Auburn's defense rallied to stymie the 'Cats. Late in the fourth quarter, with time running out for the Wildcats, Auburn had possession of the ball inside its own 15-yard line. Facing second down and eight yards to go for a first down, Auburn mentor Jack Meagher called for a quick kick, a play Auburn had used successfully on a couple occasions in the first half. Shifting into the quick kick position at the Auburn goal line, Villanova's John Wysocki and Valentine Rizzo blocked the kick, and lineman Matthew Kuber grabbed the ball at the two-yard line and went in for the touchdown. William Christopher kicked the all-important point after, and the Wildcats had gained a 7-7 tie.

1947 GREAT LAKES BOWL

Municipal Stadium, Cleveland, Ohio • December 6, 1947
KENTUCKY 24, VILLANOVA 14

Under the direction of Wildcat head coach Jordan Olivar, in 1947 the Villanova College football team ventured to Cleveland, Ohio for the inaugural Great Lakes Bowl. Their opponent was the Kentucky Wildcats.

Paul "Bear" Bryant coached the Kentucky squad, who were led on the field by legendary quarterback Jack "George" Blanda.

Villanova missed a golden opportunity to strike early when on the opening kickoff, Villanova's kick rolled around on the Kentucky two-yard line and no Kentucky player seemed eager to grab the loose pigskin. As three Villanova players converged on the ball, Kentucky's Blanda realized just in time that the ball was up for grabs, and quickly dove on the ball. Later in the first quarter, Kentucky moved the ball from Villanova's 46 to the 16, and settled for a 27-yard field goal by Blanda on the last play of the first quarter, giving Kentucky a 3-0 advantage.

The scored remained the same through the second quarter, but midway through the third quarter Kentucky's Jim Howe took a pitch from Blanda and stormed past Villanova's defenders for a 29-yard touchdown. Blanda added the extra point, and Kentucky took a 10-0 advantage.

Yet Villanova, behind the accurate throws of highly-touted quarterback Andy Gordon, marched back. Two plays into the fourth period, Villanova's Ralph Pasquariello, carrying several Kentucky defenders on his back, rambled 11-yards into the endzone. John Siano's conversion pulled Villanova within a field goal, 10-7.

Later in the fourth quarter, Kentucky's Jack Griffin broke through the Villanova line to partially block a punt, giving Kentucky excellent field position at the 25-yard line. Several plays later, Kentucky's Bill Boller raced 25 yards for a touchdown, and after the Blanda extra-point, Kentucky had cushioned its lead to 17-7. With time now against them, Villanova went to the air, but Kentucky's Boller intercepted a Gordon pass and returned it 49 yards for another touchdown. Now trailing 24-7, Gordon returned to the air. First hitting Zip Zehler with a 38-yard strike, Gordon then connected with John Sheehan for a 13-yard touchdown pass. Yet in the end, this battle of the Wildcats was won by Kentucky.

1949 HARBOR BOWL

Balboa Stadium, San Diego, Calif. • January 1, 1949
VILLANOVA 27, NEVADA 7

For a second consecutive season, Villanova head coach Jordan Olivar led the Wildcats to a post-season football bowl game. Recording a 7-2-1 regular season, with impressive wins over Texas A&M, Miami, North Carolina State, and a tie with Kentucky, the 'Cats headed west for the Harbor Bowl. Their opponent was Nevada, who was 8-1 and had recorded lopsided wins over Tulsa, Wichita, Fresno State and San Jose during 1948.

A crowd of over 20,000 on an overcast and rainy New Year's Day witnessed a dominating Villanova defense, and a fast-paced Wildcat offense, overwhelm Nevada, 27-7. The Wildcats got on the scoreboard early, scoring 13 first quarter points. First, Peter D'Alonzo dove the final three yards of a Wildcat drive for the day's first score. Robert Polidor went the final four yards on Villanova's second touchdown in the first quarter, giving the 'Cats a 13-0 advantage.

Neither team managed a score in the second period, but Nevada opened the second half by serving notice they were not about to quit. Tommy Kalmanir raced 66 yards for a touchdown, cutting the Wildcat lead to 13-7. Later in the third quarter, Wildcat end John Geppi drove another nail into Nevada's coffin when he raced 80 yards for another Wildcat touchdown. Geppi would finish the game with 114 yards on six carries. Any remaining Nevada hopes for a comeback ended when D'Alonzo scored his second touchdown of the day on an eight-yard jaunt, giving Villanova a 27-7 lead, and their first bowl game victory.

1961 SUN BOWL

Kidd Stadium, El Paso, Texas • December 30, 1961
VILLANOVA 17, WICHITA 9

Villanova University returned to post-season competition under head coach Alex Bell. Before what was then claimed to be the largest national television audience to ever view a football bowl game, Villanova put on an impressive display of rugged defense and potent offense en route to a 17-9 victory over Wichita in the 28th Annual Sun Bowl.

The confidence of the Wildcats was evident from the start. Winning the coin toss, Villanova elected to kickoff, putting its defense, which finished the year ranked seventh in the nation, on the spot. Both teams' defenses dominated the early play, and neither team could mount any kind of offensive threat. Taking control of the ball on Wichita's 43-yard line late in the first quarter, Villanova quarterback Ted Aceto recorded the game's first first down, and four plays later gave the ball to the 'Cats overpowering fullback, Billy Joe. Joe rumbled into the endzone from 19-yards out to cap a seven play touchdown drive. Sam Gruneisen kicked the extra point, giving Villanova a 7-0 lead in the first quarter.

The Wildcat defense continued to stymie Wichita, as the Shockers were kept deep in their own territory. But with five seconds remaining in the first half, Wichita finally got on the scoreboard on a 36-yard field goal. Gaining a 7-3 halftime lead, the Wildcat defense had held Wichita to just 87 total offensive yards.

Kicking off to start the second half, Villanova got a big break when Richie Ross recovered the fumbled kickoff on Wichita's 22-yard line. Seven plays later, Louis Rettino dove over from the two-yard line, Gruneisen kicked the extra point, and Villanova had expanded their lead to 14-3.

The Wildcats weren't through yet. Villanova's defense continued its tough play, and the 'Cats offense, after Wichita was forced to punt four plays later, drove the ball from its own 38 to the Shockers' six-yard line and finally settled for a 26-yard field goal by Gruneisen. Wichita added a touchdown with 45 seconds left, but the two point conversion failed, giving the 'Cats a 17-9 win. Villanova captain Rich Ross was the recipient of the Sun Bowl's Linemen's Trophy Award, while teammate Billy Joe was given the Outstanding Player Award.

1962 LIBERTY BOWL

OREGON STATE 6, VILLANOVA 0

For Wildcat coach Alex Bell, Villanova University's participation in the fourth annual Liberty Bowl marked the second consecutive year his 'Cat team was invited to a major bowl. Although the game was played in Villanova's backyard, the 'Cats were definitely underdogs.

Oregon State was famed for its passing attack, which was headed by All-American and 1962 Heisman Trophy winner Terry Baker. While not as heralded as the Oregon State squad, Villanova had also enjoyed an outstanding season, compiling a 7-2 record.

The game, telecast nationally in color by NBC to an estimated 27 million viewers, became a defensive struggle, and to the surprise of many, the Wildcats dominated. Villanova seemingly got a big break midway through the first quarter when William Sherlock's 52-yard punt was downed by Larry Glueck on the one-foot line. One play later, disaster struck as Oregon State's Baker got loose around end, and raced to a 99-yard touchdown with 9:24 left in the opening period. Baker tried a two-point conversion, but the Wildcats regrouped to break up his pass, leaving the score 6-0 in Oregon State's favor.

Another tough break doomed Villanova. Taking the ensuing kickoff down to the Beavers' 12-yard line, Villanova seemingly deadlocked the contest when Billy Joe made his way around the left end and romped 12-yards into the endzone. But a holding call nullified the play, and two plays later a Villanova pass was intercepted. The second and third quarters were scoreless, as both teams' defenses remained unbending. In the closing minutes of the fourth quarter, Villanova made one last effort.

Starting on their own 30-yard line, the Wildcats drove to Oregon State's 11-yard line before fumbling away a chance to win the game. For the day, Villanova outgained the Beavers on the ground 246-176, and had nine more first downs, 20-11. However, Oregon State's one big play, coupled with the 'Cats six turnovers, added up to a disappointing loss for Villanova.

Villanova University's football team made their first appearance in post-season play since the program was reinstated in 1985, and were faced with the realization that they would have to play the top ranked team in the nation, Georgia Southern, on the Eagles' home field in Statesboro, Georgia. Though Villanova put up a gallant battle, the Eagles proved to be too much for the Wildcats, and won the first round of the 1989 NCAA Division I-AA Playoffs, 52-36. Georgia Southern went on to win the 1989 NCAA Division I-AA Championship.

The two teams spent the first half trading scores. Following a Georgia Southern touchdown early in the contest, Villanova got on the board with seconds remaining in the first quarter on a 64-yard touchdown pass from Kirk Schulz to Harold Hart, tying the score 7-7. The Eagles scored a field goal in the second quarter, before Villanova went ahead 14-10 on a 15-yard pass from Schulz to Jeff Johnson. Minutes later, following an 83-yard Schulz to Bob Brady pass play, Schulz ran a quarterback sneak up the middle for a 21-10 Wildcat lead. Georgia Southern kicked a field goal with 30 seconds remaining in the half, sending the teams to the locker rooms with the 'Cats leading, 21-13.

The third quarter proved to be Villanova's downfall, however, as Georgia Southern shutout the 'Cats just as they had shutout all their opponents in the third quarter during 1989. The Eagles scored three touchdowns and a field goal to retake the lead and open the margin 38-21. Villanova got back on the scoreboard in the fourth quarter, narrowing the deficit to 10 points on a five-yard pass from Schulz to wide receiver Scott Thompson.

The Eagles scored two touchdowns in a span of 44 seconds midway through the fourth period to put the game out of Villanova's reach. With a little over two minutes remaining in the contest, Villanova completed the scoring with a one-yard pass from Schulz to Scott Donald. Reserve quarterback Mike Reilly passed to Pat Kennedy for the two point conversion, which made the final score Georgia Southern 52, Villanova 36.

A cold, windy day in Youngstown, Ohio brought a cold end to Villanova's 1991 football season. Playing in only their second NCAA Division I-AA Playoff game in Villanova gridiron history, the No. 7-ranked Wildcats suffered a season-ending 17-16 loss to eventual National Champion Youngstown State University.

An exciting game to watch, it was a heartbreaking game to be a part of. The Wildcats led from the start, after Tom Colombo lofted a 42-yard touchdown strike to Harold Hart to put Villanova on the scoreboard with 8:32 left in the first quarter.

The Penguins evened the tally with their first touchdown, with 14:14 left in the second quarter. Quarterback Ray Isaac connected on a 28-yard pass to Dave Roberts for Youngstown. But the Wildcats marched right back, led by senior tailback Pat Kennedy.

Kennedy, Villanova's leading rusher in 1991, had missed the prior four games with an elbow injury, but made up for lost time quickly. He scored on a three-yard touchdown with 7:14 left in the second period, but Villanova's extra-point attempt by kicker Bill Hoffman was no good.

Hoffman tried again later in the quarter, however, when he connected on a 28-yard field goal with only three seconds left in the half. The Wildcats led at halftime, 16-7.

That's the way it was until the 6:40 mark of the third quarter, when Youngstown's Leo Hawkins scored on a one-yard touchdown run, and the Penguins closed to within two of the Wildcats.

Villanova's vaunted defense stymied Youngstown for much of the fourth quarter, batting away passes and holding the line, but the offense couldn't advance despite two long drives in the final frame.

A tipped pass by Villanova's defense with Youngstown facing fourth and 11 turned into a 41-yard gain for the Penguins with under a minute remaining.

Suddenly Youngstown was in scoring position, and after two quick one-yard gains, Youngstown kicker Jeff Wilkins hit a 33-yard field goal with six seconds remaining to give the Penguins a 17-16 victory, en route to their first National Championship.

EAST TENNESSEE STATE 35, VILLANOVA 29

In the first round of the I-AA playoffs, the Villanova Wildcats lost at East Tennessee State by a score of 35-29. With the loss, the Cats finish the season at 8-4, while East Tennessee State improves to 10-2. ETSU will now advance to the second round and play at No. 1 seeded Montana.

The first half was all ETSU as the Bucs were dominant in taking a 28-6 lead at halftime. ETSU quarterback Greg Ryan was spectacular in the first half as he threw for three first-half scores. Villanova's six points came from two Mark Kiefer field goals (27-yards, 42-yards).

Villanova came out in the second half and completely took over the game. Senior running back Anthony Cowsette scored three straight touchdowns on runs of one yard, seven yards and two yards. Following Cowsette's third score, Villanova went for two and failed. However, the 'Cats were back in the game and trailed by just two points at 28-26.

After ETSU scored on Ryan's fourth touchdown throw of the afternoon making the score 35-26, Villanova quickly responded with a 14 play drive that ended in a 38-yard Mark Kiefer field goal. Kiefer had a big day as he connected on three field goals.

Villanova's comeback bid came up a bit short when they were stopped just inches from the first down marker on a fourth and 10 at the ETSU 40-yard line. ETSU took over on downs and the Bucs were able to run the clock out and escape with a victory.

Besides Cowsette's three touchdowns and Kiefer three field goals, the Villanova offense also got great play from junior running back Curtis Sifford who gained 120 yards on 24 carries. Defensively, linebacker Stephen Curry and free safety Deon Jackson led the way with 13 tackles each.

Villanova Football made their second-straight visit to the NCAA Division I-AA Playoffs, and third in four years, but had to go back to Youngstown, Ohio for a rematch with the defending National Champion. A cold, rainy afternoon in Stambaugh Stadium found the Wildcats once again battling down to the wire with the Penguins, only to lose in the final moments, 23-20.

The 'Cats scored first, taking a 6-0 lead on a two-yard run by tailback Kevin Mosley with 6:48 left in the first quarter. Bill Hoffman kicked the extra point to give Villanova a 7-0 margin, but Youngstown State marched right back and scored with 12:41 left in the second period to tie the game.

Hoffman was called upon to kick a 22-yard field goal with 8:56 left in the first half, regaining a 10-7 lead for Villanova. The Penguins scored yet again, however, with 5:43 left when Tamron Smith ran for one yard. Youngstown State's point-after kick failed, so the home squad had a 13-10 lead as they went into the locker room at halftime.

The second half began with Villanova's offense stymied on their first possession. But the second time the 'Cats got the ball, they scored. Hoffman trotted out on to the field once more, with 5:38 left in the third period, to nail a 26-yard field goal and tie the game, 13-13. On their very next possession, however, Youngstown State's Jeff Wilkins got into the act, as he kicked a 23 yard field goal to give the Penguins a 16-13 lead.

That's how the scoreboard looked when the fourth quarter began. The Penguins altered it when Tamron Smith scored his second touchdown of the day, with 11:39 remaining, and Wilkins hit the extra point to give Youngstown State a 23-13 lead. Yet the Wildcats wouldn't die, as they marched right back on the ensuing kickoff. Villanova ran 13 plays and marched 59 yards in a drive which culminated in a nine-yard touchdown pass from Tom Colombo to Harold Hart, and a Hoffman PAT. Now it was 23-20, with 7:24 left in the game.

Yet a Villanova victory was not in the cards on this day. The 'Cats fumble on their next possession, then didn't regain possession until there were 27 seconds left in the game. A valiant effort by Colombo, who hit passes for 11 yards (to Mosley) and Scott Donald (8 yards) got the 'Cats to their own 40 yard line. Then Colombo nailed Straughn Lumpkin with a 47-yard completion as the clock wound down. Villanova players, coaches, and fans thought their was still time left; Youngstown's players, coaches and fans were celebrating victory. The officials walked off the field, the contest, and Villanova's season, was over. Colombo was 16-of-19 for 177 yards in the fourth quarter (23-of-41 for 263 yards on the day), while Mosley had 33 carries for a career-high 133 yards and a touchdown, and Curtis Eller had 22 total tackles, but it was Youngstown State that once again went on to play in the National Championship contest.

The Villanova Wildcats made history, as they won the school's first-ever playoff game with a 49-28 win over Colgate. Trailing 28-27 entering the fourth quarter, Villanova tallied 24 last quarter points to win the game going away. Sophomore quarterback Chris Boden had a strong game, as he completed 21-of-31 for 305 yards and two touchdowns. Boden also ran for two scores.

After Corey Hill caught an 11-yard touchdown pass from Ryan Vena with 30 seconds left in the third quarter, No. 16 seed Colgate owned a 28-27 lead over top seeded Villanova. The Wildcats quickly responded by scoring three touchdowns in 11 minutes to take a commanding 49-28 advantage with 4:03 remaining in regulation. Boden ran in twice from one-yard out and freshman running back Brian Westbrook scored on a four-yard run to account for the three scores.

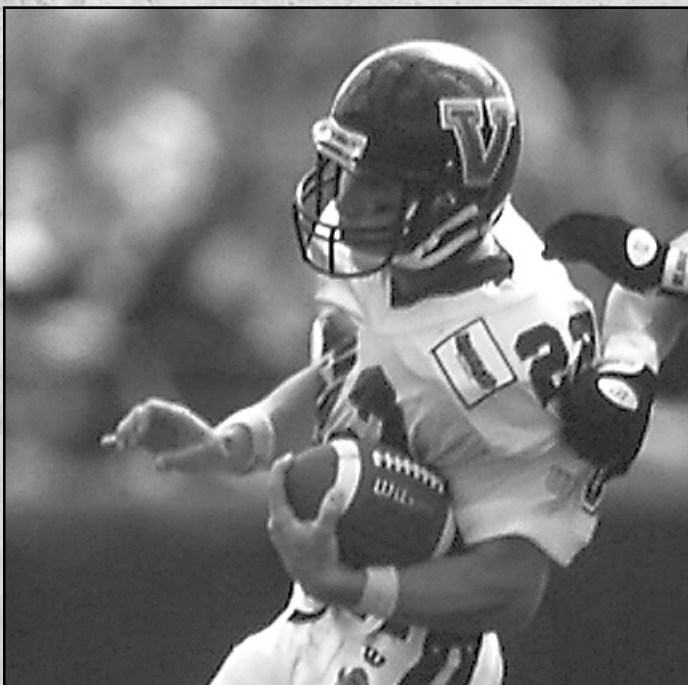
Westbrook was sensational for the Wildcats, carrying 17 times for 104 yards and a touchdown for his first-ever 100+ yard rushing game. Westbrook would score three touchdowns on the day, as he made a 38-yard scoring catch and he returned an 89-yard kickoff for a score. He would finish the day with 271 yards of all-purpose offense. Senior wide receivers Brad Finneran (six receptions for 107 yards) and Josh Dolbin (six receptions for 92 yards) led the receiving attack, while senior place kicker Mark Kiefer connected on two field goals. On defense, junior Chris Machovina registered a team-high 11 tackles, while junior cornerback Ademole Turner recorded two interceptions.

Villanova received a scare in the first quarter when All-American wide receiver Brian Finneran went down with a sprained ankle. Finneran managed to play half of the second quarter before being forced to leave the game.

Villanova saw its dream season come to a close on Saturday, Dec. 6, as the Wildcats were eliminated from the playoffs with a 37-34 loss to visiting Youngstown State. With the setback, Villanova finishes the 1997 season with a 12-1 mark. Youngstown State went on to capture the NCAA I-AA National Championship.

The Wildcats started the game in fine fashion, scoring the first three touchdowns of the game to take a 21-0 lead just two minutes into the second quarter. On their first possession, Villanova drove straight down the field and scored on a 19-yard pass from sophomore quarterback Chris Boden to senior wide receiver Brian Finneran. Freshman running back Brian Westbrook scored Villanova's second touchdown on an eight-yard scamper. Senior Josh Dolbin registered Villanova's third touchdown when he caught an 11-yard pass from Boden.

Youngstown State battle right back. Adrian Brown ran in from 23-yards for a score, giving the Penguins their first score of the day. Two minutes later, Youngstown State blocked Mark Kiefer's punt and recovered it in the end zone. The teams went to halftime, with Villanova holding a 21-14 lead.

The 'Cats started the second half as they did in the first, driving 80-yards on the first possession and scoring on a 10-yard pass from Boden to Finneran.

However, at this point, Youngstown State took control of the game, recording 23 unanswered points. The big play of the Penguin comeback, occurred at 2:55 of the third quarter when Jauron Dailey returned a Boden fumble nine yards for a score to tie the game at 28-28.

Trailing 37-28 with 2:25 to play in regulation, Westbrook kept Villanova's hopes alive, by catching a seven-yard pass from Boden, to cut the Penguin lead to 37-34. Following a Wildcat defensive stop, Villanova got the ball back with 1:25 on the clock. After an incomplete pass and a sack, Boden's desperation pass on third down was intercepted and Villanova's dreams of a perfect season came to a close.

Despite playing on a sprained ankle, Brian Finneran tied a school record with 16 receptions for 180 yards and two scores. Boden finished the afternoon 29-of-43 for 323 yards and four touchdowns, while Westbrook gained 97 yards on 17 carries and scored one touchdown. Defensively, sophomore linebackers Shaun Lyons and Dave Heckard led the charge with Lyons making 13 stops and Heckard recording 11 total tackles.

The Villanova University football team overcame a 31-14 second half deficit to beat the visiting Furman Paladins, 45-38 in Division I-AA playoff action. Senior quarterback Brett Gordon passed for 250 yards and three touchdowns en route to breaking Chris Boden's single-season record of 3,707 passing yards.

The Wildcats got on the board on their opening drive, when Gordon found senior Cameron Cross for a seven yard touchdown strike.

Furman then broke onto the scoreboard with 5:55 remaining in the first quarter when Dan Marshall booted a 38 yard field goal through the uprights. Villanova then fumbled the ensuing kickoff and Furman took over on the Wildcat 17 yard line. Senior quarterback Billy Napier put the Paladins ahead on a five yard touchdown scamper.

At the start of the second quarter, Napier led Furman 70 yards down the field, resulting in his second touchdown run of the day. On Villanova's next possession, the Wildcats attempted a fake punt, but were held to no gain and Furman took over on Villanova's 27 yard line. Furman would capitalize on their opportunity as Brandon Berry scored on a three yard run, making the score 24-7.

The Wildcats quickly changed the momentum of the game when Mo Gibson ran Brian Kovach's kickoff back 96 yards for the Villanova touchdown. The score would remain 24-14 heading into the locker room.

The Paladins used their opening possession of the second half to drive 79 yards, culminating in a Hindley Brigham four yard touchdown run.

From this point, the Villanova offense would come back to score 17 unanswered points to take a 38-31 lead with just 6:19 to go in the game. Gibson started the offensive attack when he capped off an eight-play, 80 yard drive with an 11 yard run. On the drive, Gordon completed a 15 yard pass to Brian White and an 18 yard strike to tight end Matt Chila to move the 'Cats down the field.

The Wildcats defense received two big plays from Jamison Young to force Furman to punt. Gordon then led the Wildcats 46 yards to set up a 30 yard field goal from Adam James, cutting Furman's lead to 31-24.

Villanova kept its momentum going when Young turned in another fine defensive play, intercepting a Napier pass across the middle and returning it to the Furman 29 yard line. Gordon followed with four completions, culminating in a five yard touchdown strike to White. James' extra point was good, knotting the score at 31-31 with 9 minutes remaining in the game.

On the following kickoff, senior Darnell Greene forced a fumble, which was recovered by Villanova's Gary Johnson. Johnson took the ball 16 yards to the Furman 39 yard line. The Wildcats took advantage of their field position with Gordon completing four of his next five attempts. On first and goal, Gordon rolled out and found Chila in the back of the end zone, putting Villanova ahead for the first time since the first quarter. James' extra point attempt put the Wildcats ahead 38-31 with 6:19 left to play.

Napier then moved the Paladins 74 yards, completing four passes for 50 yards, setting up Torico O'Neal's 16 yard touchdown run. Marshall split the uprights, tying the game at 38.

With 3:58 remaining, the Villanova offense took the field. Terry Butler's 12 yard run gave Villanova a first down at their own 41 yard line. Villanova kept the chains moving when Gordon hit White cutting across the middle for a 30 yard completion. On the next play from scrimmage, Butler took the ball 24 yards up the middle, giving the Wildcats a first down at the Furman five yard line. Butler then gave Villanova the lead with a five yard touchdown run with 3:08 to go.

Napier and the Paladins mounted a late rally, driving to the Villanova 29 yard line, however the Villanova defense held its ground and four passes to senior Bear Rinehart fell incomplete, sealing the Villanova victory.

Leading the way offensively for the Wildcats was Gordon who finished 27 for 40 with 250 yards and three touchdowns. Gibson added two scores, while Butler, White and Chila all added one. Defensively, Young finished with 11 tackles, five of which were for a loss and one interception.

On Saturday, Dec. 7, at Villanova Stadium, senior Brett Gordon completed 26-of-30 passes for 219 yards and two touchdowns, leading Villanova to a 24-10 victory over Fordham in the Division I-AA playoff quarterfinals. With the win, the Wildcats improve to 11-3 overall on the year and advance to the semifinals of the I-AA playoffs for the first time in school history.

Villanova got on the scoreboard first as Adam James kicked a 27-yard field goal with 8:32 remaining in the first quarter.

With 2:58 remaining in the half and the Wildcats still clinging to a 3-0 advantage, Villanova used a little bit of offensive trickery to add to its lead. Gordon hit senior wideout Brian White who lateraled the ball to freshman Mo Gibson. Gibson scampered 25 yards off the hook and ladder for a Villanova touchdown to give the 'Cats a 10-0 halftime lead.

Fordham (10-3) struck first in the second half on a 31-yard field goal by Matt Fordyce to slice the Wildcats' lead to 10-3. Villanova followed with a 14-play, 66-yard scoring drive in a span of 6:39 on the next possession, as Butler took the ball in from four yards out to increase the margin to 17-3.

The Rams caught a break at the beginning of the fourth quarter as Chris Anzano blocked a James' punt which Fordham's Adam Foley recovered and returned to the Villanova one-yard line. Two plays later, Kirwin Watson rushed in from one yard out for a Ram touchdown to cut the lead to 17-10.

The Fordham defense was unable to stop a determined Wildcat offensive attack. Villanova ate up 6:20 of the clock with a 13-play-76yard drive resulting in a nine-yard touchdown pass from Gordon to Butler giving the 'Cats a 24-10 lead with only 3:20 left in the game.

The Rams were unable to capitalize down the stretch on a stingy Villanova defense, as the Wildcats went on for the 24-10 victory.

Gordon, who played most of the game with an injured thumb on his throwing hand, finished the day 26-of-30 for 216 yards and two touchdowns. Senior wide receiver Shaz Brown (50 yard) and junior tight end Matt Chila (44 yards) each caught five passes in the contest.

Villanova used an effective ground game in the win running for 129 yards. Butler rushed for 81 yards on 19 carries and had one score, in addition to catching three passes for 33 yards and one touchdown.

On defense for the 'Cats, Isaiah Harrison and Darnell Greene each posted seven tackles, while senior Jamison Young had six tackles, two tackles for a loss and one sack in his final career home game.

Fordham, which was averaging 34 points per game going into the contest, managed only 193 total yards. Kevin Eakin went 16-for-32 for 115 yards and threw two interceptions.

The Wildcats, making their first semifinal appearance, led 21-7 at halftime before McNeese scored 26 straight points.

After Sams' touchdown catch, Jermaine Martin scored on a 36-yard reverse to make it 33-21.

Villanova's Phil DiGiacomo scored on a 6-yard run with 7:43 left to play to cut the Cowboys' lead to 33-28, but Jacob Prim sealed the win for McNeese when he scored on a 14-yard run in the final seconds.

Gordon threw first-half touchdown passes of 5 yards to Matt Chila and 14 yards to Shaz Brown. His 57-yarder to Noble Champen set up Terry Butler's 1-yard run for a 21-7 Wildcat lead.

McNeese's only score in the first half came on Achil Fairchild's 45-yard interception return.

Rodney Landers threw for three touchdowns and ran for the go-ahead score with 1:38 to play Saturday as top-seeded James Madison rallied to beat Villanova 31-27 in the Football Championship Subdivision quarterfinals.

Sophomore quarterback Chris Whitney was 13-for-20 for a career-high 213 yards for the Wildcats, and sophomore wide receiver Matt Szczur had a 2-yard touchdown run.

The Dukes trailed only once, after Szczur's 13-yard touchdown pass to Stephen Pimm out of the Wildcat formation with 6:54 left. But Landers drove James Madison 54 yards for the go-ahead touchdown and Marcus Haywood intercepted Whitney to end Villanova's comeback hopes.

The Wildcats finished 10-3, and the Dukes advanced to play Montana, the team they beat to win the 2004 national championship, next weekend.

The game was a rematch of a regular-season contest won 23-19 by James Madison on Landers' 35-yard Hail Mary touchdown pass on the final play.

Landers was the hero again this time around, throwing for 157 yards and three touchdowns and rushing for 143 more, including the winning touchdown.

Whitney brought them within a score with a 26-yard touchdown pass to Brandyn Harvey with 13:51 to play, but a missed extra point left it at 24-20.

After Pimm's touchdown, an excessive celebration penalty forced Villanova to kick off from its 15, and JMU returned the ensuing kickoff to its 46. The Dukes converted a fourth-and-2, getting a 22-yard run by Griff Yancey, and a third-and-4 on the drive before Landers took it in.

Matt Szczur returned the opening kickoff 91 yards for a score and added two more touchdowns as Villanova cruised to a 55-28 win over Colgate in the first round of the NCAA Division I Championship at Villanova Stadium.

Villanova won its fifth straight game and picked up its first playoff victory since 2002, when it advanced to the semifinals before losing to McNeese State.

Jordan Scott scored three touchdowns for Patriot League champion Colgate, which had its eight-game winning streak snapped. It was Colgate's first loss since falling to Furman, 42-21, on Sept. 13.

Szczur gave the Wildcats a quick 6-0 lead 13 seconds into the game.

Before Joe Marcoux's PAT attempt missed wide right, the game was delayed nearly 15 minutes as Villanova safety Darrel Young was carted off the field in an ambulance with a neck sprain. He was taken to University of Pennsylvania Hospital, and after the game Villanova coach Andy Talley said all tests came back negative.

Colgate eventually cut the lead to 13-7 when Scott scored on a 2-yard run with 1:22 left in the first quarter.

The Wildcats responded with 28 unanswered points for a commanding 41-7 halftime advantage. Four Villanova players scored in the second quarter.

Aaron Ball's 8-yard touchdown run for Villanova came with 1:41 left for the final score of the first half. Ball also scored from 6 yards in the first.

Szczur added a 4-yard run in the second and a 16-yard touchdown reception on a pass from Chris Whitney early in the third.

In the first round of the Division I Football Championship, No. 2 Seed Villanova defeated Holy Cross by a final score of 38-28 at Villanova Stadium to advance to the quarterfinal round for the second straight season.

Villanova traded scoring drives with the Crusaders for most of the game, but two unanswered touchdowns by the Wildcats in the second quarter provided the team with a lead they never relinquished. Chris Whitney had a one-yard touchdown run with 8:58 left in the opening half and Angelo Babbaro ran in for a score from two yards out with 57 seconds remaining in the period.

In the fourth quarter, a 25-yard field goal by Nick Yako accounted for the eventual final margin as Villanova went ahead, 38-28, following a 13-play drive which consumed more than six minutes of clock time. The Wildcats had three scoring drives in the contest that lasted 11 or more plays.

Holy Cross had a final possession after the field goal by Yako but went just 28 yards on seven plays over 1:30 and turned the ball over on downs to Villanova with 5:43 to play. The Wildcats held possession the rest of the way to run out the clock on a blustery afternoon in which wind gusts of over 20 miles per hour affected balls in the air at several points.

En route to the victory, Villanova ran up 537 yards of offense on 84 plays while holding the ball for more than 35 minutes in the game. The Crusaders, on the other hand, ran 65 plays and had the ball in the hands of their offense for just 24:18, including less than 11 minutes in the second half.

Matt Szczur had a career-high 130 yards receiving on seven catches for the Wildcats, including a 45-yard reception in the third quarter that set up Villanova's fifth touchdown of the day. Whitney completed 16-of-23 through the air for 239 yards with a touchdown and no interceptions, while also running the ball 10 times for 62 yards and a touchdown. He threw a 29-yard scoring pass to redshirt freshman wide receiver Dorian Wells late in the first quarter.

On the ground, Aaron Ball carried 23 times for 99 yards and a touchdown for the Wildcats. He got the scoring started just 4:49 into the contest with a six-yard touchdown run that capped an 11-play drive on the first offensive series of the afternoon. Babbaro ran for 75 yards and Szczur registered 55 yards on the ground along the way to racking up 238 all-purpose yards.

The Wildcat defense once again did an effective job of stopping the run, as Villanova rolled to a 298-46 edge in yards on the ground. Defensively, Terence Thomas had a team-best nine tackles.

On slippery, snow-covered turf at Villanova Stadium, No. 2 seed Villanova advanced to the semifinals of the Division I Football Championship with a 46-7 win over New Hampshire.

A steady, wind-blown snow fell throughout the entire game on a day when the temperature never surpassed the 37 degrees at kickoff. The field condition created by the inclement weather manifested itself on the first offensive play of the game, as New Hampshire fumbled at its own 22-yard line and the ball was kicked around by players from both teams before Villanova's John Dempsey corralled the ball and registered a four-yard fumble return for his first career touchdown.

The rest of the first half featured more of the same for the Villanova defense. Out of seven possessions for New Hampshire in the first half, the Wildcats gained no more than nine yards on any of them and were held to negative yards four times. Villanova ran up a 24-0 lead by halftime while outgaining New Hampshire in total offense 235 yards to minus 33 in the first two quarters.

In the second half, New Hampshire eventually got its passing game going but never got on track on the ground. The combination of the weather and the ability of the Villanova defense to stop the run limited the Wildcats to minus 66 rushing yards in the game. That figure broke the previous Villanova defensive record for fewest rushing yards allowed in a game. The old record was minus 22 and the FCS record is minus 90.

Nick Yako made a 32-yard field goal with 8:23 left in the first quarter and Angelo Babbaro recorded a 25-yard touchdown run in the final minute of the period to extend the score to 17-0. The only points in the second quarter came on a one-yard quarterback sneak by Chris Whitney at the 10:28 mark of the period.

Babbaro ran the ball 13 times for a career-high 148 yards and a pair of touchdowns on the day. He tallied his first career game with over 100 yards on the ground and Villanova surpassed 300 rushing yards for the fourth time this season. Babbaro added a 59-yard touchdown run in the third quarter and three different Villanova players carried the ball at least 12 times. Whitney generated 58 yards and the one score on 14 rushes while Aaron Ball amassed 46 yards on 12 carries.

The Wildcats stretched their lead to 39-0 by the end of the third quarter thanks to a team safety, a 29-yard touchdown run by Matt Szczur and the second score of the game by Babbaro. The touchdown run by Szczur gave him nine consecutive games with a touchdown via either a rush, a reception or a pass. He finished the day with 40 yards on seven carries and two receptions for 46 yards.

Whitney threw the ball just five times and was 3-of-5 for 44 yards, including a 29-yard throw to Szczur in the second quarter which was the only time in the game that Villanova looked downfield on an offensive play.

Villanova finished the game with a 387-84 margin in total offense yards. The Wildcats held the ball for nearly 36 minutes of the game and didn't allow New Hampshire to pick up positive offensive yardage for the game until late in the third quarter.

Junior wide receiver Matt Szczur ignited the offense with a 62-yard touchdown run and executed a fake punt that eventually led to a one-yard quarterback sneak by Chris Whitney, as No. 2 seed Villanova advanced to the title game of the Division I Football Championship with a 14-13, come-from-behind victory over William & Mary at Villanova Stadium. The Wildcats scored touchdowns in the third and fourth quarters to rally for the win, which set a new program record for single-season victories (13).

Villanova's offense stagnated for much of the game against the nation's top rushing defense, but Szczur changed that with a big run at the 9:03 mark of the third quarter for the Wildcats first points of the game. The score trimmed a 10-point deficit down to 10-7 and got the ball rolling for Villanova through the rest of the game. Whitney's one-yard run at the 10:57 mark of the fourth quarter gave the Wildcats their first and only lead of the game.

After a 40-yard field goal by Tribe kicker Brian Pate made the score 13-7 in favor of William & Mary at the 2:13 mark of the third period, the Wildcats started their next drive from the Tribe's 48-yard line following a 31-yard kickoff return by Szczur. On 4th-and-8 from the 46-yard line near the end of the quarter, Szczur executed a fake punt for a nine-yard rush and a Villanova first down at the Tribe 37. A review of the play by the instant replay booth confirmed Szczur's spot.

On the same drive early in the fourth quarter, senior wide receiver Brandyn Harvey caught a 16-yard pass on 3rd-and-7 from the William & Mary 22-yard line. He was initially ruled out of bounds at the six-yard line and the pass an incomplection, but the call was overturned based on an official review in the booth.

A number of plays literally came down to inches or less in deciding the game. On 2nd-and-goal from the eight-yard line, junior running back Aaron Ball carried for seven yards just past the one-yard line. A third official review revealed that he had not gotten into the end zone. Whitney was then stuffed on 3rd-and-1 before sneaking in on the right side on fourth down for a 14-13 lead and the eventual game-winning touchdown.

The Wildcats turned the game around with their backs up against the wall due to a 10-0 halftime deficit against a William & Mary team that entered the game giving up fewer than 12 points per game to its opponents. Villanova possessed the ball for just 9:14 in the first half and managed only 70 yards of total offense, including just 25 yards on the ground. In the second half, the Wildcats held the ball for 17:32, including nearly the entire fourth quarter (12:58). Villanova wound up gaining 168 yards on the ground and had 267 yards of total offense.

Szczur ran for 92 yards on eight carries and Whitney picked up 37 net yards (62 gained, 25 lost) on 17 rushes. Through the air, he was held to 7-of-20 accuracy for 98 yards. Harvey caught a team-high three passes for 65 yards on the night.

Villanova received a big lift from Dominic Scarnecchia, who placed six of his eight punts inside the Tribe 20-yard line with his unusual rugby-style punting. Scarnecchia averaged 37.6 yards on his eight punts.

On the defensive end, Fred Maldonado and Terence Thomas had seven tackles each to lead four Wildcats with at least six total stops. In addition, John Dempsey had a 17-yard interception return.

Matt Szczur rushed for a career-high 159 yards and carried No. 2 seed Villanova to its first national championship in front of 14,328 at Finley Stadium. The Wildcats knocked off No. 1 seed and undefeated Montana to win a national title as head coach Andy Talley reached the pinnacle of college football in his 25th season on the Main Line. Szczur racked up 270 all-purpose yards en route to being named the championship game's Most Outstanding Player.

Villanova trailed 14-3 midway through the second quarter before putting the ball in the hands of Szczur and junior Chris Whitney. Szczur ran for a five-yard touchdown with 3:34 left before halftime and later accounted for the winning margin with a three-yard touchdown run at the 11:04 mark of the fourth period. Whitney finished with 102 yards on 16 carries while also completing 10-of-13 passes for 142 yards with one score and one interception.

Along the way to winning the championship, the Wildcats totaled 493 yards of total offense. Early in the contest the team set a new single season record for total offense in a season, adding to records already established for rushing yards and rushing touchdowns in a season. Whitney finishes the season with 987 rushing yards, more than double his own previous record for the most rushing yards in a season by a Villanova quarterback. The Wildcats held the ball for nearly 20 minutes after halftime after Montana had a narrow edge in controlling the ball in the first half.

Whitney hit Chris Farmer for a three-yard score with 5:27 left in the third period to give the Wildcats their first lead of the game at 16-14. Villanova had given up a lead just two times all season long and didn't relinquish their advantage in the biggest game in the century-plus history of the program.

A game of this magnitude was never going to end without a great charge by the Grizzlies in the waning moments. Montana quarterback Andrew Selle completed a 53-yard touchdown pass to Jabin Sambrano with 1:07 to play to pull the Grizzlies to within just two points. Montana was unable to convert an onside kick, however, as the attempt went out of bounds. The Wildcats were then able to run out the clock and finish off their championship run with their ninth consecutive victory.

The game was a tale of two halves on the offensive end for the Grizzlies, who scored on a 24-yard touchdown reception by Marc Mariani at the 3:15 mark of the first quarter and then stretched the lead to double digits on a four-yard scoring reception by Sambrano with 6:48 to play in the second period. Mariani caught nine passes for 178 yards in the first half but did not catch a pass in the second half.

Villanova scored first in the game on a 23-yard field goal by Nick Yako with 5:12 left in the opening period. Yako made six of his last seven field goal tries of the season and his lone attempt in this game gave the Wildcats a brief 3-0 lead before Montana roared back with 14 unanswered points.

After Szczur recorded the first touchdown of the night for the Wildcats in the second quarter, Yako missed an extra point attempt wide left. It was the first and only miss of the season for Yako, who set individual and team single-season record in his first collegiate campaign for extra points (kicking) made and attempted.

In the second round of the Division I Football Championship, No. 10 Villanova dominated the final three quarters of the game and advanced to the quarterfinals with a 54-24 victory over No. 3 Stephen F. Austin at Homer Bryce Stadium in a remarkable come-from-behind effort. A 14-point deficit after the opening quarter was quickly shaken off by the defending national champions, as the Wildcats scored 47 of the game's final 50 points.

Senior quarterback Chris Whitney threw for a career-high four touchdowns, junior wide receiver Norman White caught a career-high three touchdown passes and Villanova turned the game around with a huge second quarter in their first-ever playoff win in a true road game. The Wildcats trailed 21-7 at the end of the first quarter but rallied back to go into halftime with a 34-24 advantage before completely shutting down the Lumberjacks in the second half.

Villanova settled in offensively and fired on all cylinders with senior wide receiver Matt Szczur playing at full strength for the first time since late September and also came up with one big defensive play after another, forcing Stephen F. Austin into an uncharacteristic six turnovers. Senior linebacker Marquis Kirkland had both an interception and a fumble recovery while also making eight tackles to epitomize the play of the entire defense for the larger portion of the game.

The second quarter started with the Wildcats continuing a drive from the opening period but Villanova was forced to punt from their own 23-yard line. Junior Dominic Scarnecchia drilled a 47-yard punt, the Lumberjacks fumbled the return and freshman Craig James recovered the ball at Stephen F. Austin's 29-yard line. The ensuing Wildcats possession culminated with an 11-yard touchdown pass from Whitney to White which pulled Villanova back to within one possession at 21-14 with 10:59 left in the second quarter.

A field goal by the Lumberjacks at the 7:46 mark of the period restored a double digit lead at 24-14 but then the Wildcats surge really kicked into full gear. Sophomore kicker Mark Hamilton kicked a 37-yard field goal to give Villanova reason for optimism on special teams and the Wildcats never looked back.

Senior defensive back John Dempsey intercepted a pass to give Villanova great field position inside the red zone and the team eventually turned a fourth-and-9 situation from the 17-yard line into a game-tying touchdown on a pass from junior Marlon Calbi to White via a faked field goal attempt.

Next, the Wildcats worked just as efficiently as their opponents had earlier in the game to score 10 points in the final 34 seconds before the intermission. Whitney hit sophomore wide receiver Mikey Reynolds for a four-yard touchdown strike with 34 seconds left and Hamilton kicked a 38-yard field goal as time expired to send Villanova into the locker room with a double-digit lead thanks to a 24-point second quarter turnaround.

Whitney was 21-of-30 through the air for 222 yards and also ran the ball 13 times for 49 yards as the Wildcats eclipsed 200 yard passing and rushing in the same game for the second time this season. White had six receptions for 69 yards and the three scores, although just as crucial to the team's offense was having Szczur back in top form.

In his second game back after missing the previous seven contests, Szczur caught a career-high 11 passes for 128 yards and a touchdown while also running the ball nine times for 68 yards. Senior running backs Aaron Ball and Angelo Babbaro added 63 yards and 47 yards rushing, respectively.

Senior wide receiver Matt Szczur had a career-high four touchdowns and threw for another score to lead Villanova into the semifinals of the Division I Football Championship with a 42-24 victory at No. 1 seed Appalachian State at Kidd Brewer Stadium. The defending national champion Wildcats won on the road for the second straight week to reach the semifinals for the second year in a row and third time in program history.

For the first time in his career, Szczur registered touchdowns by way of rushing, receiving and passing in the same game. He did all that in the first half alone as Villanova built a 28-10 lead by halftime before staving off numerous attempts by the Mountaineers to start a rally in the second half. This was the 32nd consecutive game since 2003 in which the Wildcats have defended a double-digit halftime lead en route to a victory.

Appalachian State twice cut its deficit to 11 points in the second half but both times Villanova answered with touchdowns of its own – on runs from Szczur and senior quarter back Chris Whitney – to maintain control of the game.

The game started with the Mountaineers needing just four plays to score on their first possession and take a 7-0 lead on a 46-yard run by Travaris Cadet just 1:12 into the contest. It was the type of quick strike Appalachian State wanted to make over and over and was a similar start to the one Villanova endured in the second round last week, when the Lumberjacks of Stephen F. Austin scored first and eventually led by 14 points in the first quarter.

No uphill climb was necessary for the Wildcats this time, as Szczur scored on a two-yard run with 8:18 left in the first quarter to tie the game at 7-7. Later in the first quarter, Mountaineers wide receiver Devon Moore caught a pass near the sideline and broke away for a 74-yard play before being taken down at the five-yard line. Villanova reversed the momentum of that play, however, by holding Appalachian State to a field goal which put the hosts up 10-7.

Then it was off to the races. Szczur threw a 54-yard pass to junior wide receiver Norman White, who made a running one-handed catch on his way into the end zone for the Wildcats first lead of the game, 14-10 with 21 seconds left in the first quarter.

Next up was a 30-yard touchdown pass from Whitney to Szczur, followed by a 24-yard run from Szczur which stretched the Villanova advantage to 28-10 with 5:17 remaining before halftime. Those two scores were business as usual for the Wildcats, who have scored almost 40 percent of their points this season in the second quarter and have a 152-58 scoring margin in the second period of games for the year.

Szczur wound up running for 105 yards and three touchdowns on 16 carries, caught a team-high five passes for 45 yards and a score and went 2-of-2 through the air for 58 yards and a touchdown. He had 207 all-purpose yards and this was the second time in his career that he found three different ways to score a touchdown in the same game; the other was in the first round of the playoffs in 2008 and included touchdowns via a rush, pass and kick return.

Villanova had possession of the ball for nearly 33 minutes in the game, with more than 28 minutes of that time coming in the first three periods. Whitney was an efficient 12-of-16 for 106 yards and a touchdown, with White making four catches for a team-high 88 yards and a score.

Bo Levi Mitchell threw four touchdown passes as Eastern Washington beat Villanova 41-31 in the semifinals of the FCS playoffs.

Villanova, the defending national champions, lost four fumbles, each leading to EWU scores.

Mitchell, who transferred to Eastern this season after losing the starting job at SMU, completed 27 of 38 passes for 292 yards and was not intercepted. Brandon Kaufman caught eight passes for 135 yards.

The Eagles were without leading rusher Taiwan Jones, who gained 1,742 yards before suffering a broken foot against North Dakota State last weekend. Freshman Mario Brown ran for 104 yards.

Villanova was held to 230 yards of offense and committed six turnovers. Quarterback Chris Whitney completed just 12 of 21 passes for 95 yards and was intercepted twice.

Villanova's Angelo Babbaro returned the opening kickoff 86 yards for a touchdown and a 7-0 lead. But Mitchell hit Nicholas Edwards for a 31-yard touchdown pass on EWU's ensuing possession to tie the game.

Villanova then fumbled the ball away three times on its next four possessions, after losing only 11 fumbles all season, to enable Eastern to take a 20-7 lead.

Whitney fumbled on the Wildcats' first play from scrimmage, and Eastern's Paul Ena recovered. The Eagles drove to the 6 before Mike Jarrett kicked a 24-yard field goal for a 10-7 lead.

Villanova fumbled on its next series, the second fumble in only five plays from scrimmage, and Ena recovered again. Jarrett's 31-yard field goal gave Eastern a 13-7 lead.

Matt Szczur fumbled the ensuing kickoff, and EWU's Matt Johnson recovered. Mitchell passed 6 yards to Edwards for a 20-7 lead with 11:14 left in the half.

Szczur powered over from the 1 to cut EWU's lead to 20-14, which was the halftime score.

Villanova recovered a fumble at the EWU 33, and Mark Hamilton's 35-yard field goal cut Eastern's lead to 20-17 with 7:10 left in the third quarter.

Mitchell fired a short pass to Kaufman, who outran defenders down the right sideline for a 76-yard touchdown pass and a 27-17 EWU lead.

Whitney scored from the 1 to bring the Wildcats within 27-24 at the end of the third quarter.

A fumble cost the Wildcats again when Babbaro was stripped of the ball deep in Villanova territory, and Tyler Washburn caught it and ran 15 yards into the end zone for a 34-24 Eastern lead with 13:56 left.

Eastern's Alante Wright fumbled a punt return, and Babbaro recovered at the Eagles' 14. Whitney ran it in from the 2 to bring Villanova within 34-31 with 7:08 left.

In the first round of the Division I Football Championship host and 10th-ranked Stony Brook set the tone with long drives in the first half and defeated No. 14 Villanova by a final score of 20-10 at Kenneth P. LaValle Stadium. The loss concluded a terrific season for the Wildcats, who reached the FCS playoffs for the fourth time in five years.

One of the nation's best running teams was in top form as the Seawolves ran for 263 yards and scored two rushing touchdowns in the second quarter to take a 14-0 lead into halftime. The first points of the game came on the first Stony Brook possession, a marathon 21-play drive for 98 yards that consumed nearly 13 minutes of clock time and spanned the first two periods.

Midway through the fourth quarter a 21-yard run for a touchdown by Villanova redshirt freshman quarterback John Robertson pulled the Wildcats to within 20-10 but that was as close as Villanova could get in the closing minutes. One of the big stories in the game was time of possession and the Seawolves held the ball for more than 39 minutes.

The outcome of the game won't diminish the success of the Wildcats season. Villanova bounced back from a 2-9 campaign in 2011 in a big way, winning eight games for the 19th time in team history while reaching the FCS playoffs for the 10th time. Even with a losing record last season the Wildcats senior class still sported a sterling four-year mark of 33-19 (.632), a mark which included a national championship in 2009 and a semifinal berth in the playoffs in 2010 in addition to this year's return trip to the postseason.

Villanova made a name for itself with its running game this season but was held to 136 rushing yards by Stony Brook, only the second this season the Wildcats have been limited to less than 150 yards on the ground. Robertson accounted for 220 of the 271 yards of total offense that Villanova had and ran for a team-high 85 yards and the one touchdown on 15 carries. He was also 15-of-31 through the air for 135 yards and a pair of interceptions.

With his 21-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter Robertson also surpassed 1,000 rushing yards for the season. He became the first quarterback in Wildcats history to surpass 1,000 rushing yards in a single season and only the fifth Villanova player overall to achieve the feat. He surpassed the previous single-season rushing record for a team quarterback of 987 yards which Chris Whitney set during the 2009 national championship season.

The first Wildcats points in the game came on a 41-yard field goal by junior kicker Mark Hamilton with 7:59 to play in the third quarter. Villanova trailed 14-3 at that point and the Seawolves stretched that margin to 20-3 on field goals by Wesley Skiffington of 37 yards and 29 yards, respectively. His two field goals came less than four minutes apart late in the third quarter and early in the fourth period and put the game all but out of reach.

Senior wide receiver Norman White had a game-high seven catches for 61 yards, while junior Joe Price and sophomore Poppy Livers had three catches apiece.

Villanova received the ball to open the game but only went 39 yards on eight plays before Hamilton punted the ball back to Stony Brook. His 54-yard punt was downed at the Seawolves two-yard line with exactly 12 minutes to play in the first quarter.

The drive that ensued created a tone that held for the rest of the game. Led by running backs Miguel Maysonet and Marcus Coker the Seawolves methodically moved down the field. By the time Coker scored on a one-yard scamper 43 seconds into the second period Stony Brook had amassed 82 rushing yards on their first drive of the contest.

Maysonet also scored on a 14-yard run with 3:13 to go before halftime and finished the day with 25 carries for 160 yards. Coker also went over the century mark and ran 29 times for 107 yards. Stony Brook passed the ball on just six of its 64 offensive plays.

This season marked the second time in the last four years that the Wildcats have claimed at least a share of the CAA Football regular season title. Villanova won the league's automatic bid to the Division I Football Championship and won a conference title for the sixth time in its history.

No. 5 Villanova 29, No. 20 Liberty 22

It may not have looked pretty or felt comfortable, but the end result felt remarkably familiar as No. 5 Villanova scored 15 unanswered points in the fourth quarter and rallied past No. 20 Liberty for a 29-22 victory in the second round of the Division I Football Championship at Villanova Stadium.

Amidst heavy rain and winds, the narrow separation between the Wildcats and the Flames came on a one-yard touchdown run by junior quarterback John Robertson on the final Villanova possession of the game. It took rallies from deficits of 13-0 in the second quarter and 22-14 in the final period for the Wildcats to advance with a win. Robertson threw a 70-yard touchdown pass to junior wide receiver Kevin Gulyas with 13:17 remaining in the contest and then withstood numerous tackles to find the end zone for a two point conversion which tied the score at 22-22. His go-ahead touchdown with 1:12 left capped an impressive 18-yard drive which consumed 7:11 of clock time.

The game-winning drive was for 84 yards and Villanova ran the ball on every single play of the drive.

Robertson became the Wildcats record holder for career yards of total offense during the game finished the contest with a career total of 10,273 yards. He had 317 total yards versus the Flames, including 217 passing yards and two touchdowns to go along with 100 yards and two scores on the ground. Another school record fell during the game, as Robertson and Gulyas connected on the longest pass play in school history. Villanova had second down and 18 yards to go from its own eight-yard line in the second quarter when Robertson went deep to Gulyas for what turned into an 87-yard completion. Gulyas tallied just two catches in the game, but he accounted for 157 yards and a touchdown on those two receptions. This is the 24th time in school history that a Wildcats receiver has had at least 150 yards in a game.

Liberty raced out of the gates and opened the scoring less than three minutes into the contest. Junior quarterback Josh Woodrum scored on a one-yard run with 12:11 remaining in the opening period to make the score 7-0, while field goals of 50 yards and 23 yards by Flames junior kicker John Lunsford eventually stretched the margin to 13-0 with 9:20 left in the second quarter.

The run by Woodrum wound up being the only offensive touchdown Liberty scored in the game, but three field goals by Lunsford and a 58-yard fumble recovery for a touchdown on one of four Villanova turnovers was enough to keep the Flames in front for most of the night.

Robertson scampered into the end zone from three yards out two plays after his 87-yard completion to Gulyas and the Wildcats pulled to within 13-7 with 7:29 left before halftime. Liberty fumbled the ensuing kickoff and the ball was recovered by Villanova at the Flames 16-yard line. The fumble was forced by freshman defensive back Rasaan Stewart and, four plays later, senior running back Austin Medley scored from one yard out to give the Wildcats a 14-13 lead.

Later in the second quarter, Liberty linebacker Nick Newman recovered a fumble and returned it 58 yards for a touchdown to restore the Flames lead at 19-14.

Lunsford kicked a 21-yard field goal with 5:22 remaining in the third quarter to stretch the lead to 22-14. A nine-yard pass from Woodrum to D.J. Abnar on third down brought Liberty to the Wildcats eight-yard line for first-and-goal, but Villanova withstood three straight plays to force a field goal and keep the game within one possession.

Robertson was only 8-of-19 through the air but his two big plays helped him finish with 217 passing yards and a touchdown for the night. He also registered his fifth 100-yard rushing game of the season and the 15th of his career. Robertson and senior running back Kevin Monangai each ran for 100 yards in the contest.

No. 19 Sam Houston State 34, No. 5 Villanova 31

A back-and-forth affair came down to the final play of the game and No. 6 seed Villanova (11-3) was ousted from the Division I Football Championship in a quarterfinal loss to Sam Houston State (11-4) at Villanova Stadium. A touchdown by the Bearcats with 4:03 remaining lifted Sam Houston State to a 34-31 victory.

The two teams combined for 968 yards of offense without committing a single turnover in a well-played game by both sides. There were a total of four lead changes in the contest, including two in the final 7:15 of the game. Villanova senior quarterback Chris Polony scored on a one-yard touchdown run with 7:15 to play which put the Wildcats in front by a 31-27 margin. The visiting Bearcats countered with Jalen Overstreet's one-yard scamper for a score with 4:03 to play and a 51-yard field goal attempt by Villanova was wide left with 32 seconds left.

Polony made his first start under center since the 2012 season opener filling in for junior quarterback John Robertson, who missed the game with a concussion. Polony was outstanding in the best single-game effort of his career. He established career highs for both passing and rushing yards while surpassing 300 yards of total offense for the first time in 23 career appearances.

Senior running back Kevin Monangai rushed for 166 yards and a touchdown on 27 carries to help the Wildcats finish with 286 yards on the ground. He notched his fifth 100-yard rushing game of the season and the 13th of his career.

Eight different receivers caught at least one pass for Villanova, with senior wideout Poppy Livers leading the way. Livers caught four passes for 96 yards and a touchdown, with his 54-yard reception for a score in the first quarter providing the Wildcats first points of the game.

Sam Houston State led 7-0 at the 11:21 mark of the first quarter when LaDarius Brown caught a two-yard touchdown pass from Jared Johnson less than four minutes into the contest. After the touchdown by Livers with 9:31 remaining in the opening period, the Wildcats missed the point-after attempt and trailed 7-6.

Polony scored on a 36-yard run in the final minute of the first quarter to give Villanova a 13-7 lead, while the Bearcats went back on top (14-13) with 9:54 to play in the second quarter on a four-yard touchdown pass from Johnson to Gerald Thomas. Sam Houston State added a 32-yard field goal with 29 seconds to play before halftime to extend its lead to 17-13, but the Wildcats responded with a 46-yard field goal by senior Chris Gough as time expired to go into the locker rooms trailing by just one point.

On the first play from scrimmage in the third quarter, Johnson threw a 66-yard touchdown pass to Brown to stretch the margin to 24-16. Later in the period, Monangai broke away for a 58-yard touchdown run. Polony then found junior wide receiver Kevin Gulyas in the back of the end zone for a two-point conversion which knotted the score at 24-24 with 9:36 remaining in the third period.

Luc Swimerbergh kicked a 30-yard field goal with 10:54 left to put the Bearcats back on top, 27-24, and set up the seesaw touchdown drives for each team later in the period.

Junior linebacker Don Cherry led the Wildcats defense with 16 tackles. He tied a career high set earlier this season with that total and finished the year with 134 tackles, which ranks as the fifth-most in a single season since Villanova restored football in 1985. Senior safety Jerry Miles also reached double figures and had a career-high 10 tackles, including a tackle for loss. Cherry and senior linebacker Joey Harmon each had two tackles for loss in the game and Cherry finished the season with 21.5 tackles for loss.

Three touchdowns in a span of just over eight minutes in the first half helped No. 9 Villanova (9-3) build an insurmountable lead and advance to the second round of the Division I Football Championship with a 31-21 win over Saint Francis (7-5) at Villanova Stadium. The scoring burst that spanned the first and second quarters sent the Wildcats into the locker rooms with a 24-point lead at halftime.

Sophomore quarterback Zach Bednarczyk threw three touchdown passes in the first half and the Wildcats amassed 343 yards of offense while averaging over nine yards per play before the intermission. Junior tight end Ryan Bell scored touchdowns in each of the first two quarters and finished the day with a career-high 110 receiving yards on five catches.

Villanova led 10-7 late in the first quarter when Bell caught a 59-yard touchdown pass with eight seconds left in the period. That extended the Wildcats margin to 17-7, and the lead grew from there on touchdown receptions by sophomore wide receiver Jarrett McClenton with 12:36 left in the second quarter and Bell again on a two-yard score with 4:07 to play before halftime.

McClenton had three receptions for 65 yards and eight rushes for 50 yards to finish the day as one of three Wildcats to have over 100 all-purpose yards. Junior running back Matt Gudzak had a team-high 117 total yards on the day, including 14 carries for 62 yards and five receptions for 55 yards. Bednarczyk finished 18-of-27 for 254 yards with the three touchdown passes and one interception.

Villanova received the game's opening kickoff and went ahead 3-0 on a 23-yard field goal by sophomore kicker Gerard Smith after a 12-play, 69-yard drive that consumed 5:49 of clock time. After the Red Flash went three-and-out in just over two minutes, the Wildcats got the ball back and put together a 91-yard drive that culminated with a three-yard scoring run by sophomore running back Aaron Forbes with 1:37 left in the first quarter.

Villanova's early 10-0 lead was trimmed after just 19 seconds when Saint Francis quarterback Zack Drayer connected with Kamron Lewis for a 74-yard touchdown pass on the first play of a Red Flash drive. That made the score 10-7 with 1:18 showing in the opening period, but it took the Wildcats just three plays spanning 75 yards before Bell extended the lead back to double digits with his first touchdown of the day.

Both teams' offenses stalled in the third quarter and the score was still 31-7 entering the final period. In the opening minute of the fourth quarter, a pass attempt by Bednarczyk was picked off by Jalen Wells and returned 78 yards for a touchdown as the Red Flash closed to within 31-13 with 14:10 remaining. A pass by Drayer for a two-point conversion was incomplete and the Saint Francis deficit remained at three possessions. Drayer scored on a one-yard quarterback sneak in the final minute of the game to get the Red Flash within 31-21, but an onside kick was recovered by the Wildcats with 33 seconds remaining.

Senior defensive ends Tanoh Kpassagnon and Bryan Osei, along with sophomore linebacker Jeff Steeb, had career-high sack totals. Kpassagnon counted 2.5 sacks among his five total tackles, while Osei had two solo sacks. Steeb led Villanova with six tackles, including 1.5 sacks. Junior safety Rob Rolle and senior cornerback Jason Ceneus each had interceptions.

Even with those big plays, perhaps the biggest key for the Wildcats defense was holding the Red Flash to going 1-of-10 on third down opportunities. Saint Francis had possession of the ball for only 22:25 in the game, and ran 48 plays for 264 yards compared with Villanova running 76 plays for 495 yards.

A late field goal in the closing minutes of play proved to be the decisive margin in a tight defensive battle and No. 9 Villanova (9-4) saw its terrific season come to an end in a 10-7 loss to No. 7 South Dakota State (9-3) at Dana J. Dykhouse Stadium. The difference in the game was a 40-yard field goal kicked by Jackrabbits redshirt freshman Chase Vinatieri with 1:21 to play. On their final possession following the field goal, the Wildcats turned the ball over on downs at their own 32-yard line with 41 seconds remaining.

Temperatures only reached the mid-30's for Saturday's game and a wind-driven light snow fell for the majority of the game. Those conditions, and a Wildcats defense which has been one of the nation's best all season long, helped to stifle the high-powered South Dakota State offense for much of the afternoon. Villanova held the Jackrabbits to 10 points and 197 yards of total offense, compared to their season averages of 37.4 points and 481.7 total yards.

Junior linebacker Ed Shockley led the Wildcats with 10 total tackles and registered his third double-digit tackle game of the season. Freshman defensive lineman Jeff Wiley and redshirt freshman Jafonta Johnson each tallied sacks in the game.

South Dakota State took a 7-0 lead with 2:40 left in the first quarter when Dallas Goedert caught a four-yard touchdown pass to cap a 78-play drive. That was all the offense that the Jackrabbits could find until the waning moments of the game. Villanova tied the score at 7-7 just before halftime and then held South Dakota State to just 12 total yards on 11 plays in the third quarter.

Sophomore quarterback Zach Bednarczyk was 20-of-36 for 220 yards and a touchdown in the game, with sophomore wide receiver Alex Padovani catching a six-yard pass with two seconds left in the second quarter. His second touchdown of the season ended a drive in which the Wildcats gained their best offensive traction of the day. Villanova went 80 yards over 15 plays in 6:30 at the end of the half to go into the locker rooms tied.

Bednarczyk connected with eight different receivers in the game, with three players making four catches apiece. Junior tight end Ryan Bell had a team-high 55 yards and junior running back Matt Gudzak added 43 yards to go along with a team-best 66 rushing yards on 17 carries.

Villanova Stadium, home to Wildcat football, field hockey, lacrosse, and track and field teams, has a long and successful tradition. The Wildcats begin their 90th season of conducting intercollegiate athletic events inside the distinguished on-campus stadium in 2017.

Officially dedicated on October 8, 1927, the Wildcats wasted no time establishing a winning tradition inside their new stadium, winning the opening football contest against Lebanon Valley 32-7. The 'Cats went on to extend their home win streak to 14 games before finally suffering its first football defeat in Villanova Stadium in 1930.

Because this historic site includes two memorials to former Wildcats, alumni and fans often forget that the official name of this complex is Villanova Stadium, as it was originally dedicated back in 1927. The first memorial came soon after Villanova Stadium opened. On October 2, 1928, Leo J. Goodreau, a sophomore on the football team, died as a result of injuries received during football practice. On May 7, 1930, his classmates dedicated the playing field to his memory, with a plaque located at the main entrance to the stadium. On September 27, 1980, the track encircling Goodreau Field was dedicated to longtime Villanova track & field coach James "Jumbo" Elliott. Therefore, the 'Cats play football, lacrosse, and field hockey on Goodreau Field, while the track team runs on the Elliott Track, all within Villanova Stadium.

The stadium was originally completed at a cost of \$500,000 in 1927. Able to seat approximately 5,500 spectators, the stadium was recognized as one of the finest on-campus collegiate stadiums in the country. In 1930, the stadium had its first addition as concrete stands on the north side were added, increasing the Villanova Stadium seating capacity to 12,000. While the Wildcats continued to expand on their success inside Villanova Stadium, the stadium itself remained relatively unchanged until 1958 when the seating capacity was again increased. Extending the seating in both the north and south seating areas, Villanova Stadium capacity was increased to 13,400. A re-configuring of seats, and replacement of the entire seating with new aluminum bleachers in the summer of 1990 reduced the seating capacity of Villanova Stadium to its current 12,000.

In 1980, Villanova undertook a \$1.3 million renovation of the playing surfaces inside the stadium. The old grass playing field and the 'Cats' legendary cinder track were torn up and removed and replaced by an AstroTurf playing field and an eight-lane, Rubaturf 400-meter track. Completed in August 1980, Villanova's new track was officially dedicated the Jumbo Elliott Track on September 27, 1980 in honor of

the Wildcat's legendary track and field coach. Twenty-two former track Olympians from Villanova and a score of other Wildcat track and field greats gathered for the official track dedication during halftime of the sold out Villanova – Boston College homecoming football game, a contest the Wildcats won with an impressive 20-9 showing.

In November of 1980, six 100-foot light towers, three on the north and three on the south sides of Villanova Stadium, were installed giving Villanova's historic stadium the capability of evening and night time use. Prior to 1980, there had been one night football game in Villanova Stadium, a 20-20 tie with the Parris Island Marines on October 31, 1952. It wasn't until November 19, 1987, in front of a national ESPN cable television audience, Villanova faced NCAA I-AA No. 1 ranked Holy Cross in the stadium's first-ever intercollegiate night football game.

New to Villanova Stadium in the fall of 1992 was a fresh AstroTurf-8 playing field, and Rekortan-S track. Installed in the summer of 1992, the \$1.25 million project began after Villanova's commencement exercises were concluded in the Stadium on Sunday, May 10. The next day, work began on the refurbishment of the playing field and track. The original AstroTurf and Rubaturf surfaces, installed during the summer of 1980, were torn up, and the new surfaces installed over the course of three months.

Each year, Villanova Stadium plays host to a wide assortment of athletic contests ranging from CYO and club levels to high school and international events. Hosting all-star athletic events as well as high school championships, the Jumbo Elliott Track annually hosts some of the East's top collegiate track and field meets, including 25 of the last 37 Big East Conference outdoor track and field championships. In November, 1991, the Stadium hosted the

NCAA Field Hockey National Championship, won by Old Dominion University. In the fall of 1998, Villanova Stadium was the site of the Big East Field Hockey Championship. In May of 2013, Villanova Stadium hosted the NCAA Division I women's lacrosse national championships.

In the fall of 1999, the Stadium underwent yet another face-lift with the Stadium Renovation Project. Included in this project was a state of the art press box that included a first class facility for both print and radio media to use, in addition to housing an 80-person meeting room for all Villanova Athletic Department personnel to use.

Yet, most of all, Villanova Stadium is known for Wildcat Football. Since making their debut in Villanova Stadium back in 1927, the Wildcats have compiled an impressive 238-98-5 overall won-loss-tie record on their home field, for a .705 winning percentage. Since the revival of Wildcat Football in 1985, Villanova is 128-51-0 at Villanova Stadium, and 74-39 in home conference contests.

There was a new look to Villanova Stadium in 2002, as the former AstroTurf playing field was replaced during the spring of 2002 with a synthetic grass surface known as AstroPlay.

The Jumbo Elliott Track underwent a remodeling effort in the summer of 2007. Installed was a BSS 1000, 13 mm dual durometer, full pour polyurethane track system. The new track surface will provide the Wildcat Track & Field Program with a first class running venue.

In the summer of 2011, Villanova Stadium underwent another renovation when the FieldTurf duraspine pro synthetic turf field with rubber in fill was installed. The FieldTurf will provide the stadium with a first class playing surface for all Wildcat teams to use for both practice and game competition.

There are more than 10,000 undergraduate, graduate and law students in the University's six colleges – the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, the Villanova School of Business, the College of Engineering, the College of Nursing, the College of Professional Studies and the Villanova University School of Law. As students grow intellectually, Villanova prepares them to become ethical leaders who create positive change everywhere life takes them.

Villanova University was founded in 1842 by the Order of Saint Augustine. To this day, Villanova's Augustinian Catholic intellectual tradition is the cornerstone of an academic community in which students learn to think critically, act compassionately and succeed while serving others. Villanova prepares students to become ethical leaders who create positive change everywhere life takes them.

The strength of the Villanova experience comes in part from the University's welcoming community. All members are bonded together by a shared responsibility to uphold the ideals of Saint Augustine and let the principles of truth, unity and love guide their lives. The Villanova com-

munity helps students grow intellectually, professionally and spiritually, and challenges them to reach their full potential.

The University's rigorous academic experience, rooted in the liberal arts, forms an environment in which students and professors are partners in learning. The Villanova community is dedicated to providing a personalized experience that fosters every student's intellectual and spiritual well-being. As part of their education, students are encouraged to enrich their own lives by working for those in need. Through academic and service programs, students use their knowledge, skills and compassion to better the

world around them.

Villanova University is located in a suburban community 12 miles west of Philadelphia, Pa.

AN EXCELLENT ACADEMIC REPUTATION

For nearly two decades, Villanova has ranked first in *U.S. News & World Report's* "America's Best Colleges" in its category of Master's Universities (North). Villanova is also a member of the two most prestigious honor societies – Phi Beta Kappa and Phi Kappa Phi. Villanova's College of Nursing is designated a Center of Excellence in Nursing Education by the National League for Nursing.

The value of the Villanova education has also been recognized: *U.S. News & World Report* ranks Villanova first in Great Schools, Great Prices (Master's, North Region) and Bloomberg BusinessWeek ranks Villanova in the top 25 nationwide in Top Undergraduate Return on Investment.

THE STUDENTS

Villanova's more than 6,300 undergraduates come from 45 states plus Washington, D.C.; Guam; Puerto Rico; the U.S. Virgin Islands; and 53 foreign countries. The mid 50 percent SAT scores of the recently admitted class is 1330–1440/1600, ACT: 30–33, and the GPA range is 3.80–4.20 on a weighted 4.0 scale. 53 percent of first-

year students receive need-based financial assistance from the University.

THE FACULTY

Villanova's 585 full-time faculty - 90 percent of whom hold the highest degree in their field - teach classes that average 22 students. The student : faculty ratio is 11:1.

THE EXPERIENCE

Villanova is a welcoming, caring community of learners. Villanova offers themed Learning Communities, which create innovative educational environments where first-year student live in the same residence hall, take their Augustine and Culture Seminar together, and participate in tailored co-curricular programs. Service to others through volunteerism and service-learning projects is a fundamental part of the Villanova experience, and 75 percent of undergraduates participate. Villanova students may also choose to study abroad for a summer, a semester or a year; compete on one or more of 11 men's and 13 women's sports teams at the NCAA Division I level or on one of 44 club and intramural sports; and take part in any of more than 250 extracurricular groups and activities.

ACCREDITATION

Villanova University is accredited by the Middle States Commission on Higher Education, an institutional accrediting agency recognized by the U.S. Secretary of Education and the Council for Higher Education Accreditation. In addition, Villanova and its undergraduate programs have received accreditation from the American Chemical Society, the Computing Accreditation Commission, and the National Catholic Education Association. Villanova is a member in good standing of the National Association for College Admission Counseling. Villanova School of Business programs are accredited by the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB). Villanova College of Engineering programs are accredited by the Accreditation Commission (EAC) of ABET (Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology). The Villanova College of Nursing program is fully accredited by the CCNE (Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education) and is approved by the State Board of Nursing of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Graduates are eligible to sit for the NCLEX (registered nurse licensing exam).

The Reverend Peter M. Donohue, OSA, PhD, became the 32nd president of Villanova University on June 1, 2006. Under his leadership, Villanova has charted a course of significant transformation that includes embarking on an ambitious ten-year strategic plan, launching the University's largest comprehensive fundraising campaign, initiating a vibrant physical campus renovation and dramatically expanding student opportunities.

PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

Throughout this transformative period in Villanova's history, the University has introduced new initiatives, become more nationally recognized for its academic prowess and broken University admission records. Father Donohue has also worked together with students, faculty, staff, alumni and parents to strengthen the Villanova community and renew its commitment to the institution's Augustinian, Catholic educational mission.

A champion of the role of service learning at Villanova, Father Donohue instituted



an annual St. Thomas of Villanova Day of Service as a way for the University community to propel its Augustinian ideals into action. Each September, nearly 5,000 students, faculty, staff and alumni take part in projects throughout Greater

Philadelphia. This is just one of the many service learning opportunities at the University, which boasts more than 250,000 hours of service in the local, national and international community.

AN ACCOMPLISHED SCHOLAR

Born in the Bronx, New York, and raised in Royal Oak, Michigan, Father Peter earned a bachelor's degree from Villanova University in 1975 and was ordained an Augustinian priest in 1979. He has a master's in Theatre from the Catholic University of America, a masters in Divinity from the Washington Theological Union, and a PhD in Theatre from the University of Illinois.

Father Donohue is a tenured associate professor at Villanova who served as chair of the University's department of theatre from 1992 to 2006. He annually directed musical theatre productions on campus, earning six Barrymore Award nominations and one Barrymore Award for Outstanding Direction of a Musical from the Theatre Alliance of Greater Philadelphia.

Mark Jackson is in his third year as the Villanova University Director of Athletics in 2017-18. Jackson is responsible for providing executive leadership, strategic direction and oversight for all of Villanova's 24 varsity sports and more than 550 student-athletes. He is also charged with managing the department's fiscal affairs, personnel, strategic planning, facilities, general operations and public relations. As part of the university's senior leadership, Jackson is a member of the President's Cabinet and is the direct liaison between the Athletic Department and the broader campus community.

Villanova is a member of the BIG EAST Conference and the Colonial Athletic Association Football Conference, and also competes in the Colonial Athletic Association (rowing) and Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (water polo). In addition, club sports and an extensive intramurals and recreation program fall under the auspices of the Athletic Department.

Jackson's commitment to excellence in every facet of the student-athlete experience has fostered an environment that has allowed the Wildcats to be successful on all fronts in the first two years of his tenure, while maintaining Villanova's place among the nation's elite institutions for the combination of its academic prestige, athletic achievement and community service.

Villanova has been presented with the BIG EAST Conference President's Cup in each of the first two years that this across-the-board honor has been awarded. The President's Cup recognizes the BIG EAST member school that has excelled at an elite level in athletic competition, academic performance and community service. In just two years at the reigns of the Wildcats athletics program, Jackson has overseen a national championship in men's basketball, an individual national title in men's cross country, six BIG EAST team titles and six teams who have advanced to national postseason play.

During the 2016-17 academic year, the men's basketball team returned to the No. 1 national ranking and won its fourth consecutive BIG EAST regular season title in addition to winning the postseason conference tournament for the second time in three seasons. The women's basketball team won 20 games for the fifth consecutive season and reached the semifinal round of the WNIT for the first time. Men's cross country student-athlete Patrick Tiernan capped his record-setting collegiate career by becoming the second Villanova men's athlete to win the NCAA cross country title. Other highlights from 2016-17 included the football team returning to the FCS playoffs and the men's soccer team reaching the NCAA Tournament for the first time in program history. The women's swimming & diving team won its fourth straight BIG EAST crown in dominant fashion.

Villanova student-athletes consistently make the grade in terms of academic performance, and their success in the classroom has soared to new heights in the last two years. A record 15 teams earned NCAA public recogni-

tion awards in 2017 for having a multi-year Academic Progress Rate (APR) score that ranked in the top 10 percent of their sport nationwide. There were just seven Division I programs to earn as many as 15 public recognition awards, and that total also was the most among BIG EAST schools. Villanova was also one of just seven schools to earn recognition in the high-profile sports of football and men's and women's basketball.

As a group, the Wildcats student-athletes have maintained a grade-point average above a 3.0 for 28 consecutive semesters, including a GPA of 3.256 for the 2016-17 academic year. Jackson debuted the Athletic Director's Honor Roll in 2016 to recognize student-athletes with a semester GPA of 3.2 or higher. In the first two semesters since this honor was created, there were 345 student-athletes recognized for the Fall 2016 semester and 336 honored for the Spring 2017 marking period. In the most recent academic data announced by the university, Villanova had 23 varsity teams achieve a GPA higher than a 3.0 during the Spring 2017 semester. A group of 20 student-athletes representing 12 different teams achieved a perfect 4.0 GPA in the spring.

In just a short time at Villanova, Jackson has played a key role in the record growth of the Villanova Athletic Fund. The past year has been particularly significant, as the Andrew J. Talley Athletic Center opened in November 2016 and was followed by groundbreaking in May 2017 of a comprehensive renovation to the Pavilion. This latest project was made possible by a \$22.6 million total leadership gift from alumnus William B. Finneran '63 in April 2016. This marks the largest gift ever to Villanova Athletics and propels the University forward, adding momentum generated from winning the 2016 national championship.



The opening of the Talley Athletic Center created a brand new home for the Villanova football program and benefits all student-athletes with a centralized athletic performance center. The building houses the Wildcats sports medicine operations and "The Howie Long Strength Training Center" in addition to an academic support suite, a 100-seat meeting room and a reception/training table area. Other amenities include a new football locker room, coaches' offices and equipment room.

Jackson helped to secure an anonymous \$1.3 million gift, the largest ever to a Villanova Athletics women's program, for the construction of a new home venue for the field hockey team at the Proving Grounds in nearby Conshohocken, Pa. This transformational gift provides a new home for the field hockey team and positively impacts both the competitive and recruiting landscape of the program. A similar project was completed in September 2016 at the Villanova Ballpark at Plymouth, where the baseball team plays its home games. Through the generosity of alumni and friends of the baseball program, artificial turf was installed on the infield and behind home plate. Outfield wall padding was added in March 2017. These collective enhancements greatly improve the game-day experience of the Wildcats student-athletes.

The success of Villanova's athletics program in 2016-17 came on the heels of a remarkable 2015-16 campaign which was highlighted by the men's basketball team winning the second national champion in program history. Head coach Jay Wright was named the Naismith Men's College Coach of the Year and the men's basketball team was one of four Wildcats teams that advanced to national postseason play. The women's cross country team earned a berth in the NCAA

Championships and the volleyball team made its second-ever NCAA Tournament appearance. The women's basketball team also returned to national postseason play. Villanova finished the year ranked No. 74 in the NACDA Directors' Cup, including second among BIG EAST programs and fifth among FCS football schools.

In addition to his responsibilities on campus, Jackson is involved with several external committees outside the university. He is currently the chair of the BIG EAST Athletic Directors Committee and the Big Five Athletic Directors Committee, as well as the Co-Chair of the Collegiate Sports Summit For Athletic Directors.

Jackson came to Villanova with nearly 20 years of experience and a comprehensive knowledge of all sports and the associated support that is necessary to sustain a high-level collegiate athletic program. Lynn Tighe is in her 20th season at Villanova, and currently is a Senior Associate Athletic Director and the Senior Woman Administrator. In her role, Tighe manages the personnel function for the Athletics Department and serves as the liaison with key campus offices, including Human Resources, Admissions,

Residence life and Dining Services. She returned to her alma mater in November, 1998, as an Assistant Athletics Director and has since earned two promotions to her current capacity.

In addition to being the Deputy Title IX Coordinator for the University, Tighe led the recent review of the Athletics gender equity position that included representatives from around the University and she contributed to the development and launch of the Leadership Institute for Wildcat student-athletes. Tighe is the sport administrator for 14 Wildcat teams where she oversees all matters associated with the designated sports. In his role, Kenefick oversees all aspects of Villanova's Media Relations Department. He is also beginning his 22nd season as the contact for both the football and women's basketball programs.
